Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Lent is a season of reflection. It comes from an Old English word meaning "a lengthening." As the days of spring become longer, nature sings a song of renewed life, energy and growth. The emerald tinted leaves, the gentle wafting breezes, the richer blue azure of the sky all harmonize their beauty in spring's eternal symphony of life.



During Lent we Christians are called upon to reflect together on the final weeks of our Lord Christ's ministry. We remember his betrayal, arrest and suffering upon the cross. Lent is a time for us to reflect, as well, on our own discipleship. It examines with the forensic skill of a pathologist our own motivations in serving Jesus. Like a deep sea fisherman plunging to the coral reef below, we, too, plunge below the surface and examine who we are and why we are here in God's world.

What motivates you in the Christian life? The Louisville Courier-Journal ran a series of advertisements for a motivational conference featuring nationally-known speakers. Good business leaders recognize the importance of motivation in cementing a business deal or enticing a customer to buy a product.

Motivation is essential to healthy living. A good marriage flounders unless both partners are committed to remaining faithful to and interested in one another. A successful championship season is impossible unless coach and players are fortified in the fray of competition by being highly motivated. In the spiritual life our motivation is important if we are to serve Jesus with energy, intelligence, imagination and love.

In the gospel of Matthew 6:1-24, we see Jesus examining with care our motives. He gazes into the hardened heart of the pharisaical gremlin lurking in all our souls. His scalpel cuts to the bone of the skeleton hypocrisy we keep well hidden in our soul's shuttered closet. How often do we catch ourselves doing a good deed with an ulterior motive, thinking such thoughts as, "If I help the boss out by staying late, perhaps he will promote me and not Mr. Smith at the next desk?" "If I tithe, perhaps I can buy my way into heaven." Or, "If I cheat ...I won't be caught." Our self-deception can be a wonder to behold.

Peter Marshall, the famed Scottish preacher of a generation ago, said in his sermon, "Under Sealed Orders,"

'...Faith is belief plus what you do with that belief." We can't grow in faith if our motives are as dirty as our old gardener's gloves we put to use in the spring.

Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday (**February 26**, 2020), is a season of hope. Lent is furthermore a time to grow in God's graciously given faith. A time to face facts and our

hypocrisy. A time to repent and seek to be more honest in our service to the Savior. A compass can be used to draw circles or a straight line. If on Ash Wednesday, we will look with care at our account, we will conclude:

- a. We have fallen short of our profession of faith by hypocrisy, selfdelusion and pride.
- b. We have used people as things and things as people.
- c. The Ash Account of repentance and new life in Christ gives us hope as we examine our motives and renew our commitment to selfless service in Christ's name.

Christ is our compass on the Lenten road which begins on Ash Wednesday. With Jesus as our guide we pick up our crosses and follow

him. A friend told me he had read of the death of a beloved pastor. My friend mused, "I cannot recall what he said in his sermons as much as I can the Christ-like way he served his congregation. Because of his guidance I am today a Christian."

Christ is our compass, our guide, our redeemer and our friend. When we look at the Ash Account we see the bottom line in our service to others, our forgiveness by Christ and our love to a hurting world. As we journey through Lent together, we are invited by God to let the invigorating breezes of Lent flood our souls.

With James Russell Lowell, let us examine our motivation in the Christian life and seek to be more honest, loving and servant-like. "Give to the hungry sweet charity's bread, for giving is living," the angel said. "Must I be giving and giving again?" the weary, wondering question came. "No," said the angel, piercing me through, "Just stop, when the Lord stops giving to you."

Have you examined your Ash Account?

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WORSHIP AT FUMC IN FEBRUARY



The church is now in the **Season** *after* **Epiphany** and for this season the liturgical color is green. Let's start this month with a question: what is the purpose of the Season *after* Epiphany, that time in the church year between the end of the Christmas season, Epiphany or the end of the twelve days of Christmas, and the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday?

Taylor Burton-Edwards answers questions about United Methodist Worship and he tackles this question of purpose in a video at: https://



Burton-Edwards says that the agenda for the season after epiphany is to help the church get ready for its work during Lent. That work of the church during Lent is to walk with people on a journey to either deepening their commitment to the baptismal covenant or committing to live the way of the baptismal covenant for the first time. There are four Sundays in February that are part of this season. The last of them is Transfiguration Sunday, a very special Sunday in the church year. Three days later is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. We will have much more about the Lenten season in the March issue of The Church BELL.

Pastor Sundar will be leading worship each Sunday in February. Every Sunday we have an early worship service at 8:30am. This service is more informal and lasts about one half hour. Our regular worship service begins at 9:30am each Sunday. Be here for an hour of worship that includes our sanctuary choir and other musical groups. At 1:00 pm we have a worship service at Hawthorne Ridge lasting about 45 minutes. The first Sunday of the month Holy Communion will be a part of all three services. All are invited to any of these services. Come and bring a friend.


A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CHILDREN'S CHRISTIAN EDUCATION




JOSEPH'S HOUSE MEAL

GREEN CHURCH UPDATE



At its January meeting, the Greener Church Team members kicked off the year-long project in earnest. We discussed what brought them to the table: the influence of the youth movement, a growing awareness that Christian principles call us to disavow indifference and take action, concern for destruction of plant and animal species, concern for the pollution of the waters, awareness of the impact of climate change on vulnerable

communities (see the articles in this newsletter on Early Response Teams and the Food Crisis in Lesotho) and the knowledge that solutions exist if we are willing to take the necessary action. The Team endorsed both conducting an energy audit of the church and obtaining bids from community solar providers, both proposals to be reviewed with Church Council. Scheduled activities include a Climate Reality Project presentation on **February 9th** (see related article), an Eco-Fair on **March 22** and possibly a special worship service and community service project on **April 19**, the Sunday before Earth Day. At its **March 9th** meeting, the Team will be considering other suggestions made by the congregation for earth-friendly actions.

FOOD CRISIS!

Qholaqhoe Mountain Connections (QMC) was established in 2009 in response to the dire needs of the population of the rural Qholaqhoe (kwuh-**lock**-way) Mountain region of the country of Lesotho (le-**sue**-to), a developing country geographically surrounded by South Africa. Our church has been supporting this caring organization since 2011. We have provided financial aid to many high school students who otherwise would not have access to a high school education. Lynn Minderman, QMC founder, board member and former educator and peace-corps volunteer has spent time with us over the past nine years giving us regular



updates on the progress as well as the challenges being faced in Lesotho. Lynn and all those involved with QMC greatly appreciate our continued support.

Lynn has just informed us that devastating drought in the southern African nation of Lesotho has left more than half a million people facing severe food shortages and tens of thousands "one step away from from starvation."



The Qholaqhoe Mountain area has been hard hit by this crisis. At the high school, QMC currently provides food for 21 students through their Emergency Food Fund (EFF). Recently school staff have identified 50 additional students who are living alone with no food (many parents have gone to South Africa to find work, leaving their children behind). These students do chores after school and are given left over food from the lunch cooking pots. The high school principal says that the kids look tired, some look sick, some don't come to school anymore. Lynn tells

us that \$75. will feed a child for the 10-month school year. Our Missions Team is sending \$300. to help in this current food crisis. If you can further assist, know that your check, which can be made out to FUMC-EG with "QMC-EFF" in the memo section will be put to good use in Lesotho. Checks may be placed in the collection plate or given to Gail in the church office. Donations can also be made online at the QMC website: www.qmconnect.org. Please keep the people of Lesotho in your prayers.

EARLY RESPONSE TEAMS



Disasters both human-made and natural can emotionally, physically and psychologically overwhelm entire communities. Local businesses and homes may be destroyed or severely damaged. Insurance may not cover the cost of recovery. Fear of a repeat of the disaster can be paralyzing. United Methodists have a long history of responding to communities in the midst of disaster though Volunteers-in-Mission (VIM) and Early Response Teams (ERT). In early January, Kevin Conley and Herb Lamb joined five volunteers

from various UMC congregations to remove damaged appliances, furniture, mud and mold from basements of two homes in Wells, New York that were flooded during the October 31 rainstorm. A Basic ERT training will be held on **February 29** at North Chatham United Methodist Church from 8:30 am - 5:00 pm. 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IN THE NEWS: PROPOSAL FOR 2020 GENERAL CONFERENCE

A diverse 16-member group of United Methodist bishops and other leaders has offered a proposal that would preserve the United Methodist Church while allowing traditionalist-minded congregations to form a new denomination. The separating group would get \$25 million in United Methodist funds and would keep its local church properties. Details are in a nine-page "Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation," released January 3.

"The proposal—reached with the help of famed mediator Kenneth Feinberg, who worked on the federal September 11th Victim Compensation Fund—would have to be approved by the 2020 General Conference, which meets in May in Minneapolis. Drafting of legislation is still under way for that assembly, which is the only body that speaks for the 13-million-member global denomination.



"But given the broad, influential coalition involved—including bishops from around the global church and leaders from advocacy groups often sharply at odds—the protocol may offer a road map for resolving the denomination's decades-long struggle over accepting same-sex marriage and ordaining gay pastors.

"New York Conference bishop Thomas Bickerton, part of the group, said..."This protocol provides a pathway that acknowledges our differences, respects everyone in the process and graciously allows us to continue to live out the mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, albeit in different expressions."

"The proposal would allow other United Methodist churches to form their own denominations, while foreseeing ecumenical agreements and cooperation on some fronts.

"A clear catalyst for the negotiations was the 2019 General Conference, which saw passage of the so-called Traditional Plan reinforcing restrictions on same-sex weddings and ordination of LGBTQ persons—but also igniting passionate, ongoing resistance in the US by supporters of full inclusion.

"The fact that we were able to come together from across the world, from across theological spectrums, and define an opportunity to collaborate for the sake of the church we all love is a monumental thing," Bickerton said. "My hope would be that the delegates to the General Conference would be able to employ that same spirit as they undertake their work in Minneapolis."
