Dear Members and Friends,

There are many unusual tourist attractions in the U.S., but recently I heard of one that sounds both fascinating and depressing at the same time. There is a museum in Ann Arbor, Michigan, I understand, that has as its unofficial name, "The Museum of Failed Products. Think



name, "The Museum of Failed Products. Think about that name for a few moments, "The Museum of Failed Products." The museum looks like a standard supermarket inside. However, all the items on the shelves are products that were taken off the market because nobody bought them.

I wonder why? Wouldn't you want to buy Clairol's Touch of Yogurt shampoo? Sounds yummy. Or Gillette's "For Oily Hair Only: Shampoo? Or Pepsi's AM Breakfast Cola. And why didn't we all get excited about Colgate-brand TV dinners? Or Fortune Snookies, the fortune cookies for dogs? Don't your pets like to read their fortune each day? Can you imagine the disappointment of the inventor who poured his or her time, energy, and intellect into creating a product no matter how unusual, only to have to fail? How disheartening to have your creation end up in the "Museum of Failed Products."

I wonder if God doesn't sometimes look at us, the pinnacle of God's creation, and wonder with disappointment how we turned out the way we did? Is humanity one of God's failed products? It's something to think about as we look at Genesis 9: 1-17. The OT is full of exhilarating stories of very ordinary people possessed by an extraordinary faith. Consider Noah, at God's direction Noah built an Ark that was of enormous proportions. The ark was over 450 feet long-the size of one and one-half football fields. Just like Noah we are a covenant people. What are some of the implications of this covenant relationship? What does it mean to our lives today? There are implications that glare at us. Implications that glare at us that we disappoint God -even the best of us. We let God down for not willingly love God and our fellowman as ourselves. In a speech made in 1863, Abraham Lincoln said, "We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of heaven; we have been preserved these many years in peace and prosperity; we have grown in numbers, wealth, and power as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God...Intoxicated with broken success, we have become too selfsufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us." In other words, there is a battle within the human heart. None of us is

immune. This sad truth presents a dilemma for our Creator. God made us from the clay of the earth, fashioned us in God's own image, breathed into us the breath of life, and gave us the ability to love, to desire, to will. More significantly God endowed us with the most precious gift of all, the freedom to choose. Unfortunately, sometimes we choose wrongly. Every one of us. Even at our best, we are not all God created us to be. None of us utilizes all of our potential, all of our ability, all of our talent in a constructive manner all the days of our life. We are not the mothers we ought to be, the fathers we ought to be, the citizens we ought to be, the church member we ought to be, the minister we ought to be; we all fall short of the mark. What does God do with God's children in the light of the fact that we all fall short, we all miss the mark, the bullseye? What is God to do?

For you see, God has another problem. It can be stated like this. Though God is disappointed even in the best of us, God is hopelessly, passionately, in love even with the worst of us. In one of his books, Theologian Jürgen Moltmann known for his theology of hope wrote, "but the ultimate reason for our hope is not to be found...in what we want, wish for and wait for; the ultimate reason is that we are wanted and wished for and waited for...God is our last hope because we are God's first love."

Think about that for a minute. "God is our last hope because we are God's first love." God, the Creator of all life...The source of all that is Good...the very definition of Good....God loves us. God created us in God's image. God breathed God's life into us, God made us to be the special focus of God love. And that was only the beginning of God's plan for us.

This dilemma forces God into an unusual role. God's last word concerning this dilemma is not found in the Old Testament stories. It is found in the Gospels. Indeed, it is the Gospel. Here's what God did. God made a Covenant with us. God did that first with a rainbow and later with a cross. On February 17, 2021 we will celebrate Ash Wednesday, the day that marks the beginning of the Lenten season. At that time we prepare to face the cross and Jesus' arrest, crucifixion and resurrection. The



message is clear: God walks with us through the terrible firestorms of our lives, and we are lifted unharmed out of the ashes. We may be marked in some way, like the ash marks of the cross placed on our foreheads during Ash Wednesday. However, that mark is a symbol of God's love and protection.

Remember that the next time you see a rainbow in the heavens, will you? God's plan to save the world started before God ever created it. God sealed God's promise with a rainbow, and then made good on the promise with a cross. None of us are all we might be. But still somebody loves us and God send God's Son to die for us on the cross. That's the Gospel. A God willing to welcome home a disobedient child. A God willing to take that child's place on the cross of Calvary.

MEDICINE (PILL) BOTTLE DONATIONS

The Eco-Team is expanding its recycling activities to include medicine bottles. We have set up a bin in the foyer of the church for donated bottles and caps. They will be sent to Matthew Ministries for inclusion in shipments of medical supplies to developing countries and for shredding and recycling. The pill bottle program fulfills the dual needs of improving medical care in developing countries and caring for the environment.

Acceptable collection items include: • Prescription and over-the-counter pill bottles, • Large and small pill bottles • Pill Bottles with and without secure caps (child-resistant)

We ask that the donated bottles and caps be treated as follows:

1—Remove labels, leaving no glue or residue 2- Wash bottles in very hot water and dish soap 3—Rinse and dry thoroughly 4—Replace lids on clean, dried bottles

COVID-19 Vaccine Availability

New York State recently expanded the availability of the COVID-19 vaccine to adults age 65 and older. See the Department of Health's website at https://covid19vaccine.health.ny.gov/ for more information, to check if you're eligible to get the vaccine, and to use the online tool to find a vaccine location. You can also call the NY COVID -19 Vaccination Hotline at 1-833-697-4829 from 7AM - 10PM, 7 days a week, to schedule a vaccination appointment if you're eligible. As with any medical treatment, you may wish to discuss whether you should get the COVID-19 vaccine with your doctor.

One year, we had a "pretend" campfire and sat around it telling stories, singing and eating our just desserts. Every year we had talented singers, dancers, story tellers, poets and audience members join together for an evening of old fashioned fun and fellowship.

Steve Berger always handed out instruments at the end of the program so we, as one, sang a rousing closing sing-a-long song. Proceeds from contributions went to support the purchase of boats for victims of the Tsunami in Shri Lanka. Funds supported people at Joseph's House, local food pantries, and the Family Assistant Ministries of our church. Although I realized what a blessing performers and audiences were, not until COVID did I realize what a fabulous gift our Coffee Houses are in the lives of so many. Thirty-six performers and audiences ranging from 30 to



110 never thought it strange to come together, sitting close to each other, sharing pastries and drink, singing loudly and having conversations with friends...all activities we would love to participate in now but can't due to the pandemic..
