Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Dr. Carlyle Marney once remarked that a person can be understood as being like a house. We have our living rooms, where we entertain, and our basements, where we hide the trash. The way to observe All Saints' Day, he suggested, is to walk out into your front yard and salute the people on your balcony. The balcony people in our lives are those who have



gone before us, who have been our encouragers, who have left a legacy. That's what we do on this coming All Saints' Day Sunday. We salute all the saints who have gone before us, whose faithfulness provided us with the faith we have today.

One of the most beautiful portrayals of saints is found in the book of Revelation 7: 9-11: "After this I looked, and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice: 'Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb.' "

Notice who these saints are. "Before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb..." Our faith has always been a universal faith. It is amazing that so many Christians forget this. Saints of God come in every color, speak every language. John Ortberg tells a wonderful story about Clarence Jordan, best know for his Cotton Patch Gospels. Jordan went one time to do revival services at a church in the deep South. This was more than fifty years ago, when segregation was the norm in the South. Clarence Jordan got up to preach, and he realized that the congregation was not segregated at all. There were black folks and white folks all together. That night Clarence Jordan stayed at the home of a

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member of that church, a graduate of Yale, a college professor, who had a PhD in English Literature. He drove seventy miles each week to go to this church. Clarence asked that brilliant young professor: Why do you go to that church to hear an old country preacher? You have a PhD from Yale. He can't utter a single grammatical sentence?" The young man said: "Sir, I go to



that church because that man preaches the Gospel." And that is the Gospel. All people on the earth are represented around the throne of God.

Next, we notice "they were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands..." These saints were in the presence of a holy God, which meant they must be holy too. I don't know about you, but I don't meet very many holy people. How did these saints in heaven get that way? "They

have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb." In the Book of Revelation, it is simply a symbolic way of saying these saints have been made worthy to inherit that which was promised by God because of Christ's death on the cross. In other words, they are standing around the throne the same way all of us will one day stand around that throne, by the grace of God. If getting into heaven was a matter of merit, we would all be in trouble. Our admittance to the select company will not be based on merit, but on God's unconditional love for us. God's amazing grace. You may think sometimes that we talk about grace too much in the church today. You need to understand that there are many people, and see many church people, who do not really believe that God loves them unconditionally. There are still far too many religious people who have a god who plays havoc with their lives and who punishes them for sins of which they are not very aware. So, it is important to note that the saints of God have all their sins taken away because of God's great love for them. Notice who they are and how they're dressed.

Finally, notice what they have come through. "These are they who have come out of the great tribulation; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb." It is important to understand that God's promises are to all those who accept the gift of God's forgiveness in Jesus and those who follow in the footsteps of Jesus. Sure, we are accepted as we are, but once we turn to Christ, we are to seek to live just as he lived, love as he loved, forgive as he forgives. Many of us have a mushy kind of faith that says, "Everything's all right. Jesus loves me, this I know. It doesn't matter what I do with my life. I can go ahead living for myself as if I am the only one on earth that matters." Let me repeat those important words from Max Lucado, "God loves us just as we are, but God loves us too much to leave us that way. God want us to be like Jesus."

Who are the saints around the throne of God? Everyone on this earth is a candidate for sainthood. None of us is worthy of it, but because of what Christ has done on our behalf, it comes to us as a gift. Once it is received, however, we're to join the holy company seeking to

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bring light to a world of darkness through lives that reflect the glory of Christ.

I would like to take this opportunity to invite all of you come to our special worship on **November 7, 2021**, at 9:30 am. We will read the names of the all saints who have left this earth during the last two years to be with those who have gone before us. We will be reading their names; candles will be lit, and bells will be rung as their names are read. May God bless you and yours in His Holy Love and keep you till we meet again ...

Ring out for Climate

On October 30 our church rang the courtyard bell for climate justice at COP 26. (*If you see this issue of The Church BELL before the end of October, be sure to listen for the ringing of the bell on the 30th.*) Church bells have traditionally been used as warnings and this time the danger to humanity couldn't be greater. Churches across England and in parts of the US rang out a warning on the eve of COP 26.

What is COP 26 and why does it matter? COP 26 is the Conference of the Parties and the 2021 meeting in Glasgow this November will be the 26th meeting. They started meeting

following the UN conference in Rio de Janeiro in 1992, but despite all the conferences since then, our global carbon dioxide emissions have continued to rise. From 5 billion tonnes (metric tons) in 1950, 18 billion in 1980, 23 billion in 2000 and 33 billion in 2020. We are speeding in the wrong direction!

At the Paris Agreement in 2015, countries agreed to try to keep global warming down to 2 degrees or lower. Currently we are way off track to meet that target and the IPCC report this August was most forceful in outlining the irreversible effects we will suffer and many are already suffering.

COP 26 will run for about two weeks. Please keep the countries' leaders and negotiators in your prayers.

CROP Walk

Thirteen walkers represented our church at the CROP Hunger Walk this year, seven in Castleton (John Schmidt, Jennifer Schmidt, Fran Berger, Emily Clark, Gabrielle Deck and Kevin and Cindy Conley) and six in Myrtle Beach (Pastor Sundar and his grandchildren - Ben, Ellie, Zachary, Olivia and Isabella). The walkers were joined in spirit and fundraising by some who were unable to walk due to various circumstances: Tammy Markell, Neal Calvin and the Scheidelman family. The tally isn't final, but we know we raised over \$2,000. One quarter of donations raised from the Hunger Crop Walk is directed to the Anchor Food
