## Dear Sisters and Brothers,

A minister wrote in the church newsletter that he was setting goals for the New Year. One of his goals was to clean up his desk. Another of his goals was to find last year's goals. Some of you keep desks like that... not me, ha ha! Some of you will remember



the "Calvin and Hobbes" comic strip. In one strip Calvin and Hobbes are talking about the New Year. Calvin says, "I'm getting disillusioned with these New Years. They don't seem very new at all. Each New Year is just like the old year. Here another year has gone by and everything's still the same. There's still pollution, war, stupidity, and greed. Things haven't changed. I say what kind of future is this. I thought things were supposed to improve. I thought the future was supposed to be better." Hobbes replies with his usual keen insight, "the problem with the future is that it keeps turning into the present."

The New Year is traditionally a time for reflection. We look back over the year and assess our successes and failures. We gain some satisfaction over our successes, and we experience some grief and guilt over our failures. Each time we face a new beginning. We have hopes that things will be different and better. But as Hobbes says, the future just keeps turning into more of the present.

That may be why some of us come to church in the hopes that the Holy Spirit may fall afresh on us, and the future will be full of exciting new possibilities, positive change, and new growth. We tire of having the "same old, same old." Two men were talking about one of their colleagues. One said, "did you know he has 30 years of experience in his field" But his friend's response was, "Actually, he has not had thirty years of experience. He has had one year of experience thirty times." The future kept turning into the present for him. This is not God's plan and will for us.

Listen to our very upbeat lesson from Ephesians 1: 3-6

for this New Year: "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. For God chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love he predestined us for adoption to be God's children through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will to the praise of his glorious grace, which he has freely given us in the One he loves."

What great good news! We are God's chosen ones. God's elect. God doesn't want our lives to be humdrum, meaning less, depressing routines. God wants something better for us than that. That is why there are some things we need to recognize as we begin 2022.

First, we need to see that God loves doing a new thing. That is the exciting thing about knowing God. God loves doing a new thing. You and I are often afraid of change. We long to be able to cling to the *status quo*. Someone has said that *status quo* is Latin for "the mess we're in." It's dangerous to stick to the *status quo*. God loves change, especially changed lives. Resolutions are hard to keep, wouldn't you agree? How many of you have ever been determined to drop an old habit and begin a new one? How many of you have seen a resolution shattered the



same day you made it? Reforming is hard. What we need is not inspiration, but a transformation. Not a resolution, but a revolution. We need a change in our lives that comes from God. What every person needs are something that will permanently affect their life situation. What we need is something that will truly satisfy our longings, something that will bring true and lasting change. Our need is for God to do a new thing within us. And that can happen. God loves doing a new thing. Listen to these wonderful words of the Lord: "*The nations will see your vindication, and all the kings your glory; you will be called by a new name that the mouth of the Lord will bestow. You will be a crown of splendor in the Lord's hand, a royal diadem in the hand of your God." (Isaiah 62: 2-3).* 

I am amazed how many people think that God sees only the bad in them. They believe God is more aware of their failure than the good that is in them. They think that God is waiting to find something that they say or do wrong so that God can pounce on them and condemn them. Please know that God is much more concerned over the good in you than the bad. God is much more willing to reward your goodness than to punish your shortcomings. Many times, while we are condemning ourselves, God is trying to help us realize God's forgiveness.

One more thing we need to realize is that God's new name for us means a new beginning. It sounds unbelievable, but it seemed unbelievable when God changed Abram's name to Abraham: "Father of Multitudes." God made him a father of a nation. Sarai, he called Sarah; "Princess." What a marvelous and transforming imagination God has. How full of love God's heart is. How powerful God's spirit is, to take our failures and give us a future. How marvelous

When people talk about other people, they sometimes say: "that person will always be that way. People never change. They are hopeless." But God knows better. One of the benefits of being in the ministry is the opportunity to see people change, often quite dramatically. Never underestimate the power of God in your life or anyone else's

A New Year is also a suitable time to give other people a new chance. It is a time to also expect the best from them; to realize that with a little help and trust from you they could be different. Give people a chance to begin over again with you. You and I are to forgive those who have hurt us. If we cannot even forgive each other, how can we ever hope to experience the unconditional love and forgiveness of God. God wants something better for us in this New Year than we have experienced in the past. Listen as God gives you a new name for this New Year, and then go out and live as blessed, chosen, holy, blameless, adopted children of God. I wish you and yours and wonderful New Year.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2022 Theme

Here are some details about **four important dates in January**. The organization **CHURCHES TOGETHER IN ENGLAND** shares this information about the week of prayer.

**"The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity** is traditionally celebrated between **January 18** and **January 25** – the octave of St. Peter and St. Paul.

The story of the Magi visiting the Holy Family in Bethlehem is a very familiar one. The Magi have sometimes been seen as a symbol of the world's diversity – different religions and cultures – that come to pay homage to the Christ-child. The story might therefore represent the unity of all created that God desires.

The materials for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2022 [have] been prepared by the churches of the Middle East, the history of which was, and still is, characterized by conflict and strife, tainted with blood and darkened by injustice and oppression. The Christians of the Middle East offer these resources conscious that the world shares many of the travails and much of the difficulties that it experiences, and yearns for a light to lead the way to the Saviour who is the light that overcomes darkness."

There will be copies of a "Daily Scripture & Prayer Guide" for the Week of Prayer on the table in the church foyer and at the worship service on **January 16**.

## A PLACE, ESPECIALLY FOR YOU

The next couple of issues of The BELL will contain detailed descriptions of ways you can help our church by volunteering to serve on various committees, teams, or ministries.

"The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is not a resting place, the church is a people."

This is a quote from the first stanza of the hymn "We are the church" written in 1972 with the words and music by Richard K. Avery and Donald S. Marsh. I agree with the quote; however, a people need a place to worship God and so we have a building which we call a church. The building needs to be maintained and so we have a Board of Trustees who take responsibility to maintain the building and the grounds around the building. The people need a worship leader, who we call a pastor, and staff to support the ministries of the church and so we have a Staff Parish Relations Committee who oversees, hires, and advises our staff. All of this takes money and so we have a Finance Committee to oversee the church's finances. And all of this takes people to volunteer to serve in these capacities. The next issue of The BELL will have a more detailed explanation of the work done by these groups and how you might be a volunteer in service to these groups.

Not handy at maintaining buildings and grounds and not an expert in either staff relations or finance; well, we still have a place for you to volunteer your service. There are three major ministries of our church (worship, education, and caring for others). Each ministry has a few teams, and all need some helpful volunteers. So, search your heart, find your passion, and step up to serve on one or more of the teams. Again, there will be more detailed descriptions of these ministries and their teams in subsequent issues of The BELL.

## FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT – JANUARY 2022

We are so grateful for your continued support of our church! The Finance Committee presented



the draft 2022 Church Budget at the Church Council meeting on Wednesday, December 8. A summary of the that budget, approved by Church Council, is below. We wanted to give you an idea of how your gifts are used at our church. Overall, we think that the church's income will be about the same as it was for 2021. We also think that expenses will be slightly less than in 2021 (about 2%

less). The expenses below show the most that we will spend for those items. Our church usually spends less than the expenses we estimate. For expenses in 2022, we considered increases in energy prices but also had some savings as our Ministry Shares to support Conference will be less in 2022 (about 5% less). The difference between our income and expenses is estimated to be less than what we anticipated in our 2021 budget (about 23% less). If you'd like a more detailed copy of the 2022 Church Budget, you can get a copy in the church office. Please keep the support for our church in your prayers.

Finally, I would like to thank you all for your continued support of our church. I'm grateful that my family worships in a community that supports so many ministries and has continued to answer the call to share the Good News of God's love in Jesus Christ during such an unprecedented time.
