Dear Sisters and Brothers,



For more than 1,400 years, a Cathedral dedicated to St. Paul has stood at the highest point in the City of London. The Cathedral is one of the most famous and most recognizable sights of this great city with so many historic sites. The famous architect Christopher Wren designed the Cathedral after an the earlier one that

stood on the same site was destroyed in the Great Fire of London. Before work could begin on the new Cathedral, the remains of the old Cathedral had to be cleared away. (City of London St. Paul's Cathedral/National Churches Trust) Once the site had been cleared and the necessary measurements taken, Wren asked a worker to bring a stone to mark the center of the new building. By pure chance, the worker handed Wren part of gravestone from the old Cathedral. On the stone was the inscription RESURGAM, which means, "I shall rise again." Sir Christopher Wren was so moved that the words "I shall rise again" should appear on that stone strictly by chance, that he had the RESURGAM engraved on the exterior of the new cathedral, where it can be seen today above the great south door. ("Riverrun/ Thoughts on faith, frame drumming and ...")

"I shall rise again." Jesus tried to tell his disciples that several times before his death on Calvary's cross. You would think they would have been prepared on the first Easter morning to welcome him back from the grave. They were not. Forgotten, at least momentarily, was his promise that on the third day he would rise again. Apostle Paul later writes in his letter to the Corinthian Church that Christ has conquered the final enemy-the enemy of death, but it is clear such was not the expectation of Jesus' disciples and friends on that first Easter morning. Their hearts were heavy with grief.

A member of Abraham Lincoln's cabinet, William Seward, on Easter morning, 1865, lay in his bed, horribly wounded, shattered from having been in a horrible carriage accident. He had not been told of Abraham Lincoln's death. Lincoln, you may remember had been shot on Good Friday, two days before, and died the next day.

As he lay in his bed Seward asked to be able to see the trees just blooming. With the curtains drawn, he looked out and

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roved his eyes-and then saw a flagstaff at the War Department, and the flag flying at half-mast. He stared at it for a moment and then murmured, "The President is dead!" He knew it because if Lincoln had been alive, he would have been the first to personally call on him. He hadn't been there and hadn't even sent to inquire of Seward's condition. That could mean only that he was dead. And there was the flag flying at half-mast!

Seward said no more, but great tears suddenly rushed from his eyes. The disciples of Jesus were stricken with the same kind of grief. They had forgotten Jesus' promise that, on the third day, he would come back to them. All they knew was that their Lord was dead-and with him all their hopes, dreams, and aspirations. They were overwhelmed with their sense of loss. But that, of course, is not the



end of the story. If it were, I would not be here today writing this message of hope and new life in Jesus Christ.

According to St Luke's gospel account of the resurrection, a group of women made their way to the tomb early that Sunday morning to prepare Christ's body with spices. There they found the stone rolled away from the grave and two men in dazzling apparel who said to them,



"Why do you seek the living among the dead? Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the son of man must be delivered into the hands of evil men, and be crucified, and on the third day rise?' And they remembered Jesus' words, and they returned to tell the eleven disciples and the rest of Jesus' followers, "He is alive! He is alive! He has conquered death as he said."

You may know the story of a gentleman who stood one day looking into a store window. Standing next to him and looking in was a little boy. It was Easter time, and in keeping with the season the shopkeeper had arranged a setting of the crucifixion. After a while, the boy turned to the man. "Those are Roman soldiers," he explained. The man said nothing but

man. "Those are Roman soldiers," he explained. The man said nothing but kept studying the window. And there's Jesus," the boy continued. Still no response. "They killed him," the boy said. By this time the man, having satisfied his curiosity, started to walk away. Then he heard the patter of young feet behind him and felt a tug on his sleeve, it was the boy. "Mister," he said, "I forgot to tell you the most important part. He's alive again!" That, of course, is the most important part. He is alive. Christ has defeated the final enemy - death.

But what does Easter mean in our lives-we who are Christ's followers today? Doesn't it mean that we no longer must fear death either?

Wish you and yours a blessed Easter. May the Risen Christ empower and guide your footsteps all the days of your lives.

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### SOME NOTES ABOUT WORSHIP FOR APRIL

What a busy month April is when it comes to things religious. In our Christian faith communities, we celebrate the last Sundays of Lent, Holy Week and Easter Sunday. The details of our celebration of these very important church events are described in more detail on page 5 of this issue of The Church BELL.

In addition to these events, our United Methodist Church celebrates one Sunday in April for a particular reason. That's **April 24**. A 2016 GBCS article explains why.



"The United Methodist Church designates one Sunday each year, preferably the Sunday closest to Earth Day (April 22), as a Festival of God's Creation, celebrating God's gracious work in creating the earth and all living things. . . The General Board of Church and Society works with ecumenical partners through Creation Justice Ministries to rally Christians on behalf of protecting God's creation. . . The United Methodist Church is among 37 national faith bodies, including Protestant denominations and Orthodox communions, as well as regional faith groups, and congregants working with Creation Justice Ministries to protect and

restore God's Creation."

If you are of the Muslim faith, you will be looking to Ramadan. The month of Ramadan begins on April 2 and runs through May 2. It is a time of fasting from dawn to sunset, introspection, prayer, and community. Those of us who have kept close to the family of Khin Oo know something about this firsthand as they are a Muslim family. All look forward to iftar, the feast that breaks the daily fast. Khin, his wife and two children (now four children) were the first refugee family our church helped re-settle in the United States a little over twenty years ago.





If you are part of the Jewish faith community, you will celebrate Passover **April 15—April 23**. This seven-day holiday will be celebrating the exodus of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt.

# Of Course—Easter does not end with Easter Sunday

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### **WORSHIP IN THE LENTEN SEASON & EASTER**

We began our Lenten Season here in East Greenbush with an Ash Wednesday worship service

on March 2. Following that we usually began our series of ecumenical Lenten Worship and Luncheon programs. Covid changed that again this year. For most of March we have been limited to our regular Sunday morning worship programs. Moving into the month of April, Palm Sunday, **April 10** recalls the memory of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. We will begin our week that day with our regular worship schedule plus the Youth Palm Parade at 9:15 am. Next will be Holy Thursday, **April 14**. That service will be held at 7:00 pm in the sanctuary. The service will also be available virtually on Facebook and by Friday on YouTube.

### **United Methodist Women Gets A Rebrand**

**United Methodist Insight**, on March 4 published this story, which we quote in part, about a big change for the United Methodist Women (UMW). "As of March 3, <u>United Methodist Women has become United Women in Faith</u>, a rebranding and updating of the mission agency that has been five years in the making. While the announcement of the change took many by surprise, the changes have been wrought with meticulous care through research, focus groups and interviews with some 24,000 women. In a typically bold move ("bold" is a word much beloved by UMW), the organization's board of directors decided to proceed with its rebranding without benefit of General Conference legislation. <u>A new, more accessible website</u> debuted March 3 to begin rolling out innovations in membership and programs to accompany the new name."

A new logo and other changes are designed to address the different needs and life stages of current members and new women, and to expand options for membership and engagement. You will still hear the name UMW used in some places for legal and other reasons, so it has not totally disappeared.

"United Methodist Women's Assembly 2022 is for members, new friends, and partners to gather, worship, care for your soul and learn about the needs of women, children and youth in the 21st century. And women who are willing to be challenged to grow in their faith as they build deeper connections with one another, community leaders and partners in the work of justice for all of God's children."

### **NEXT GENERAL CONFERENCE SCHEDULED FOR 2024**

The once every four years event, General Conference, the 2020 session has been postponed again. The church now plans to skip right to the session in 2024. The Commission on General Conference issued a press release on March 3, 2022, part of which is extracted below.

"Nashville, Tenn.: As the pandemic continues and the wait time for visas stretches to over two years in some countries, the Commission on the General Conference announced today that the 2020 General Conference cannot be held in 2022 due to COVID-related and governmental policies/constraints....

"The Commission appreciates that many people are disappointed about the circumstances of the 2020 General Conference and shares in the disappointment that it has not been able to be held," said Simpson. "COVID-19 has tested the collective patience, understanding, compassion, resolve, and even faith of the world. Commission members remain



hopeful and pray that the world's circumstances improve to help make the next General Conference not only possible, but a reminder of the witness of The United Methodist Church as a global representation of the body of Christ."
