SOME NOTES ABOUT WORSHIP FOR JUNE

Get ready for a very busy month. First thing, start the month by checking your closets or dresser drawers for something red to wear to church on **June 5**. That's Pentecost Sunday. *Happy Birthday Church!*



Now, let's take a look at some changes in our Sunday routine happening this month. Early worship at 8:30 am outdoors at Chapel in the Woods has already begun and will continue until fall. In case of inclement weather, the service will be held in the Fellowship Hall.

On **Sunday June 19** we will move into our summer mode and move to the Fellowship Hall for our 9:30 am morning worship service. Technologically, the Fellowship Hall services will continue to be live streamed on Facebook. As of our publication date, these services will **not** be posted later on YouTube.

Pastor Sundar is preparing for his new assignment in Vestal and will be preaching the first three Sundays in June, his last Sunday sermons in East Greenbush. George Herrick will lead worship on **June 26**.

Turn now to some dates and events in the month.

June 5 is Pentecost, one of the top three most important dates in the Christian faith. For a quick reminder of the meaning of this day, take a look at <https://chuckknowschurch.com/archive/29pentecost>. **Don't forget**, wear something red for morning worship. This is Holy Communion Sunday for June. Special on this Sunday, this year's Confirmation Class will reaffirm their baptismal vows for themselves. One more, our First Communion class will be recognized. Help celebrate these two groups of our youth at the Garden Party following morning worship.

June 12 is Trinity Sunday and also **Peace with Justice Sunday**. "United Methodists relate to this special Sunday by seeking peaceful solutions, creating and supporting peace-related ministries in their conference and learning about peaceful, just efforts around the world."

You may not have known that you were recognized last month during our ninth annual Change the World event but it was pretty obvious. You (or your efforts) were seen by others near and far. Two carloads of groceries were donated during a food drive held at church on May 1. They were delivered to Veterans at the VA Center in Albany and to the local food pantry, CoNSERNS-U.

Three members of our church joined about twenty volunteers at the Riverfront Park in Rensselaer in early May for a couple of hours and gathered more than 500 pounds of trash, thus diverting it from the Hudson River!

Climate Change Mitigation: Electric Vehicle Considerations

Cars and trucks generate about 20% of all Green House Gases (GHG) in the U.S. [1] Manufacturers have steadily reduced these pollutants over the last 50 years to improve our air quality, but they are still a major contributor of GHG that have changed our climate over the same period. Motor vehicle manufacturers, realizing they need to eliminate emissions if we are to make a significant impact on climate change, plan to develop more electric vehicles to address that impact over the next 10 to 15 years[2]. This poses new considerations when people are deciding to purchase or lease a vehicle. Here are some pros and cons:

Battery electric vehicles (BEV) or internal combustion engine (ICE) vehicles?

Battery electric vehicles (BEV) cost more to purchase than internal combustion engine (ICE) vehicles, but BEVs have lower maintenance and operating costs, which results in a lower overall cost[3]. BEVs have higher GHG emissions than ICE vehicles in the manufacture of the vehicles, but the low GHG emission of BEVs rapidly overcomes that difference.[4] Presently, utilities generate electricity from a mix of renewable and nonrenewable sources. When utilities generate electricity entirely from renewable sources, the GHG emissions for BEVs will be zero.

Battery Electric Vehicle (BEV) or Plug in Hybrid Electric Vehicle (PHEV)?

BEV and PHEV are the two types of electric vehicles readily available today. The range of the vehicle is determined by the battery energy alone in a BEV and the battery energy and gas energy in a PHEV. The PHEV can use the current gas station infrastructure and electric charging infrastructure on a long trip while the BEV is dependent on the expanding network of charging stations. Therefore, taking a long trip in a PHEV takes less planning than that required for a BEV. However, the PHEV will emit GHGs on a long trip when gas is used, whereas the BEV has no GHG emissions on any trip. Both BEVs and PHEVs do very well with short trips with very few GHG emissions from PHEVs. PHEVs are well suited for someone taking most trips within the range of the battery while BEVs may be preferable to someone who needs to take more long trips or wants to minimize the output of GHG from their vehicle. Either choice will reduce GHG emissions and trips to the gas station.



Battery Recharging: Chargers for BEVs and PHEVs can utilize one of three levels of charging. Level 1 uses 120 Volt AC power and can add 4 to 6 miles of range per hour. Level 2 chargers use 240 Volt AC power and can add 12 to 54 miles of range per hour. Both EVs and PHEVs can use either Level 1 or Level 2 chargers which a homeowner can have installed in a home. Level 3 chargers are only compatible with BEVs and use DC power to add 80% of the vehicle's range in 15 to 45 minutes. These chargers are usually only found in public locations due to installation requirements.

Battery Capacity/ Range. The energy capacity of the battery pack in an electric vehicle dictates the distance that a vehicle can travel between charges and the cost of operating the vehicle. If you have more battery than what you need for most of your driving, the additional battery weight now needs to be transported by the vehicle at a higher cost than what a lower capacity battery would. This should be a consideration in the purchase of a BEV or PHEV.

Temperature Extremes. Extremely hot and very cold temperatures affect the performance of BEVs and PHEVs which results in shorter ranges during the summer and winter months. Consequently, you would need to purchase an EV or PHEV that has a higher capacity than your normal commute would require to offset impacts from extreme temperatures. Please note that PHEVs will require the engine to run in extremely cold weather or periodically to condition the internal combustion engine.

The availability of recharging stations and recharging times are still big challenges to the acceptance of BEVs. Manufacturers, the federal and state governments are working on these issues to achieve much lower GHG emissions from the transportation sector.

State and/or federal tax credits may be available for the purchase or lease of select BEVs or PHEVs.
