Greetings,

My summer started by packing. As I pack my library, I see there are books that I've read them more than once in different years. Some pages are like a rainbow. That's an old habit. When I read a book for the first time, I highlight it with a yellow marker. The second time, green! The third time, blue!

When I look at these different colors, I see different stages of my life. It seems the words look different as I grow up. Eight years ago, the second line of the first chapter seemed important to me. Six years ago, the fifth line seemed very meaningful. Three years ago, the second paragraph of page thirty one was an eye opening statement.

My Jesus is like a rainbow too. I've read His Holiness several times in different years with different markers. It looks like that I have met three Jesuses; the spiritual Jesus, the religious Jesus, and the resurrected Jesus.

As early as twelve years old, Jesus was on a quest to find the Truth. One day, his parents almost lost him because of his thirst for participating in philosophical and theological discussions about God. It is recorded in the Gospel of Luke that he was found in the temple "in discussion with the elders. They were amazed at his learning, especially given his young age."

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Like a devoted Sunday school student, he was participating in the synagogue's activities and events. Like a seminary student, he sought in his young life to fulfill God's will.

Eventually, he experienced his God in the wilderness and he touched his God in the waters of baptism at the Jordan River. He rejected the idea of God as a distant, patriarchal, avenging king and instead preached the "good news" —not only for himself or the Jews, but for all humanity. He preached the Gospel: God is "Our Father." As the Gospel of Matthew records it, "At that moment heaven was opened, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased."

Jesus recognized his personal relationship with God as the pattern for our personal relationship with God, and, actually, all humans' relationship with God. Jesus drew our attention to God's love. He connected our hearts to a God who is steadfast, faithful, loving, kind, compassionate, merciful, and present as a father or mother.

At this point, I can hear that Jesus said, "I am spiritual but not religious." One day, He clashed with the



religious authorities because of his liberal attitude to the observance of Sabbath and his declaration that ritual purification mattered less than purity of heart. His bold reinterpretation of the religion consistently moved away from an external observance of religious rules to spirituality. He welcomed the faith of a non-Jewish Roman soldier, a centurion and then he proclaimed that the Gentiles would even displace Jews in the Kingdom of God. He refused to recognize the barriers that divided people from one another in society. His habit of mixing with the ostracized classes – even of eating with them – earned him the name "friend of tax-collectors and sinners." Women held

an unconditionally high place in his following, and not all of them were respectable by the lenses of religious people. YES, I met this spiritual Jesus who opened the spiritual eyes of many by reinterpreted the religion. And I converted to His spirituality. I became a spiritual Danyal. Those days I announced that I am spiritual but not religious.

Then, I met the second Jesus: the religious Jesus, a man whose spirituality was interpreted as a religion. I met a man whose testimony of God (known as the "New Testament") informed Christianity.

The Gospel of Matthew records that the religious Jesus "entered the temple courts and drove out all who were buying and selling there." He overturned the tables of individualism, selfishness, and personal benefits. He said, "God's house will be called

a house of prayer." And then he taught his disciples to pray for the coming of "our Father's will on earth as it is in heaven." He reprimanded us, saying that God's will is often not visible on earth. Racism and racial injustice are not God's will. Global warming and environmental pollution are not God's will. Poverty and food insecurity are not God's will. We have to work for God's will to be done. As Adam Hamilton says, when Jesus approached the sick, the blind, the lame, and the grieving, he did not say your sadness, your pain, or your tragedy is God's will. NO, instead, he worked to rectify their situation. And we, as Christians, are supposed to do the same, not only to serve others but to attain inner peace and joy in our daily lives.

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YES, I met the religious Jesus whose religion was centered on God's kingdom, where there is an end to violence and suffering, and there is peace and justice for all human beings, regardless of their differences in age, race, beliefs, social class, gender, and sexual orientation. I met the religious Jesus who is a human rights activist. And so, I converted to his religion, the religion of humanity in which all God's children matter. Since the God of this religion is my "refuge and strength, and an ever-present help in trouble," my asylum was granted and I became a citizen of "The Kingdom of God." I became a Christian, a religious Danyal. Those days I announced that I am spiritual and religious at the same time.

Finally, I met the third Jesus: the resurrected Jesus who is very practical. I was a new citizen in the kingdom and so my hands were almost empty. My knowledge and experiences were, and are still, limited. I haven't been a Christian since I was born. I haven't had the opportunity to be nourished in a Christian family. As a child, I



never attended a Sunday school or a camp retreat. I was like that young boy who had only five loaves of bread and two fishes among five thousand religious men and women. Does Jesus see me? Am I worthy? What can I do for myself or others? Can I serve them?

I made my decision. I entrusted my limited knowledge to the resurrected Jesus. I entrusted my spiritual gifts, talents, and potential to the resurrected Jesus. And He saw me. He called my name. He multiplied my limited resources. He fed me, and not only

me. He also fed two congregations, Valley Falls UMC and Living Hope UMC, for almost five years with just the five loaves of bread and two fishes that I had offered Him.

Also, we have leftovers. Like the event that Gospel of Matthew recorded, "They all ate and were satisfied, and the disciples picked up twelve basketfuls of broken pieces that were left over," our ministry has fed others. Our virtual classes and Sunday services are available on line, that many others may also be fed the Good News. These days I announce that I believe in mystery; the mystery of Trinity, the mystery of Easter, and the mystery of Pentecost.

In the beginning of summer 2022, as I start a new season and a new chapter, it would be a good idea if I find a marker with a new color. It is a good time for reading and experiencing His Holiness again. In last years, I used the yellow, green, and blue. I'll take the orange this time. Do you join me?

During the gardening, someone asked about the marker in the Memorial Garden. In 2013, The Upper New York Commission on Archives and History revived a tradition of honoring clergy who have died by presenting their families with a bronze grave marker. Their policy reads "It shall be the policy of the Upper New York Annual Conference Commission on Archives and History to present to every deceased pastor's family (with) a bronze grave marker in recognition of their service to God and to the Conference." Former pastor Bill Vigne's cremains are interred in our Memorial Garden.

CORNERSTONE CAMPUS MINISTRY NEEDS SOME HELP



The Protestant Campus Ministry is launching a special fund-raiser for Legal Fees for one of our students who is seeking asylum and we hope you can help! One of our freshmen students arrived in the US in March 2020 with a visitor visa. Then COVID happened and the country went into lock down and she was unable to return to her country. When it became apparent that the lock down would last for some time, her aunt enrolled her in high school. She was able to complete High School a year early and with the encouragement of her school advisor she applied for college. She was admitted to UAlbany and started in the fall of 2021. She has excelled in her pre-med program with a 4.0 GPA. Near the end of the semester, she was notified that she was accepted for a job on campus. She reached out to Chaplain Sandy Damhof for help because they asked for her social security number, and she didn't have one. Now a legal team is involved and it has been said that the student clearly has a strong case for seeking asylum.

This is where you and our church family come in. We need to raise \$3,500. to pay her legal fees. Late word indicates that \$2,155. has already been pledged. SOME QUESTIONS HEARD AROUND CHURCH THIS MONTH

- Do members of the "Made By Hand" group do tatting?
- I've seen the line, "A Reconciling Congregation" on the first page of The Church BELL. What does that mean?

These were two of the questions raised in an earlier issue of The Church BELL. If you have a question you would like answered, email it to editor@fumceg.org and please put "Church Question" on the subject line of your email.

Now, here is one question and answer for this month.

Question: Why is Pastor Sundar being moved to a new church?

<u>Answer:</u> This answer applies to Sundar and all United Methodist clergy. Our unique system of deploying clergy has its roots in the earliest days of Methodism. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, preached up to 40,000 sermons in his lifetime. He was an "itinerant" preacher, traveling from town to town in England, setting up Methodist societies.

"John Wesley believed that itinerant preachers who moved from place to place were more effective than those who settled in, grew comfortable, and wore out what they had to say,"...



... in 1756, Wesley wrote, "We have found by long and consistent experience that a frequent exchange of preachers is best. This preacher has one talent, that another; no one whom I ever yet knew has all the talents which are needful for beginning, continuing, and perfecting the work of grace in a whole congregation."...

United Methodist pastors are sent, not called or hired. "<u>Itinerancy</u>" refers specifically to the commitment by pastors to go and serve wherever their bishops send them. "Appointment" is the action taken by bishops. These are different, yet related.

Clergy in The United Methodist Church commit to serve where their bishop appoints them. Appointments are typically for one year at a time, though the bishop may move any itinerant pastor at any time. The goal of the appointment process is to match as much as possible the gifts and graces of the particular pastor or deacon with the ministry needs of a particular congregation or ministry setting. In this "serial leadership" of consecutive pastors and deacons — no two are alike — over time, the combination of skills blends to form a broad base of developed ministries....

..."In a connectional system such as United Methodism, the question from any individual congregation or from any individual [clergy] is not, 'What is best for me?' The question is 'What is best for us, the whole connection?'...
