FROM OUR PASTOR'S DESK

In October 2022, I invite our church to focus on the children's ministry. Not only our church but the universal church is longing to see more kids attending in the Sunday children's time, more youth participating in the ministry of church, and more young disciples following the Christ passionately. To love and honor children, our congregation is invited to participate in the children's ministry.

Jesus loved and honored children. "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you



will never enter the kingdom of heaven," Jesus told his disciples. ¹First, he publicly claimed children as models of pureness of heart and joy inherent in the kingdom of God.² In addition, we see that the Christ blessed children through his messianic touch by the raising of Jairus' daughter from death. Finally, we learn that he was very serious about the spiritual journey of "little ones" that can be also all the people who just started to walk in the path of faith regardless of their age. "If anyone causes one of these little ones—those who believe in me—to stumble," Jesus says, "it would be better for them to have a large millstone hung around their neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea."

John Wesley was also committed to the education and formation of "the little ones"; and traditionally, the United Methodist Church has provided a space for children to learn, grow, and actively engage in the congregation.

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

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SOME NOTES ABOUT WORSHIP FOR OCTOBER

What does the month of October mean to you? In an article entitled, Seeing our blind United Methodists in October--and beyond, Rev. Leo Yates, Jr. writes:



"Observances in October are plentiful: Down Syndrome Awareness Month, Lupus Awareness Month, Global Diversity Awareness Month, and Hallowe'en are just a few. But often overlooked is that October is Blind Awareness Month. . . . the **National Federation of the Blind** recommends this month -long recognition be one that remembers history, advances equality, and celebrates accomplishments and supports persons who are blind or have vision loss.

"As United Methodists, we are called to value all people as being of sacred worth. The Bible has many passages relating to or specifically about persons who are blind, particularly in the gospels. At least one of the Apostles had a visual impairment. - .- Matthew explicitly states Jesus had compassion toward blind

persons (Matthew 20:30) --likely because of the isolation and loneliness they faced due to bad theology and neglect. A starting place for biblical application is for Christians to share Jesus' compassion too, which can begin with learning about persons who are blind or have vision loss. . .

"It only takes a glance around the sanctuary or virtual space to see the many people with some sort of visual impairment (they're wearing glasses). . . Recalling John Wesley's concern for medical self-care, a part of this monthly observance can be to raise public awareness about vision and eye health."

October 2: 17th Sunday after Pentecost, World Communion Sunday

FLOOD BUCKETS

Once again this year, the Missions Committee will be filling 15 UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) Flood Buckets, and so we are asking for your help. If your budgets allow you to help, we are asking for contributions of the following items for each bucket; the items are needed by October 16.



- One 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent
- o One 16-40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner (No spray cleaners)
- One 16-34 oz. bottle dish soap
- One 4-8 oz. pump spray air freshener (three solid, or three gel fresheners also acceptable)
- One 6-14 oz. pump spray insect repellent (pack of 10-20 wipes also acceptable; Pump spray bottles must have protective covers)
- One scrub brush (With or without handle)
- 18 re-useable cleaning wipes— No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels (Remove from packaging)
- Five scouring pad sponges— No stainless-steel pads with soap in them— Remove packaging
- 36-50 clothespins
- One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic line)
- a roll of 24 heavy-duty trash bags (33-45-gallon sizes; remove from packaging)
- Five N95 particulate respirator dust masks (1-3 mm thickness; no surgical masks)
- Two pairs kitchen gloves (Durable for multiple uses)
- One pair work gloves (Cotton with leather palm or all leather)

Last month, we began our series highlighting the various Caring Ministries within our church. This month we feature Family Assistance and Kairos. Please consider becoming involved.

Before COVID-19 challenged us and changed our lives, members of our church family experienced life-changing crises and the inability to pay





bills. The types of crises impacting families who participated still impact families in addition to the stress of COVID. Our Church has always reached out to others with a "helping hand."

In 2014, Zarina, Roman and Reema Khan became actively involved in our church as both refugees and asylum seekers from Pakistan. We started the Zarina Fund to help raise money to assist the family in accessing basic survival needs...a home, food,

medicine, health care, etc.

The Zarina Fund was renamed The Long Term Family Assistance Fund as we recognized that other church families experienced more extended life crises requiring support that could not be met with the Pastor's Discretionary Fund, and was recently renamed the Family Assistance Ministries. Since 2014, 19 people (6 families) have participated in the Family Assistance Program. Four of the six families now are financially independent and thriving. Two families currently participate in this ministry and there may be more in our church who need a little help from FAM and don't know yet about the program. All who have participated comment that the Church community literally saved their lives.

Each of us could be a family in crisis and not know where to turn. FAM participants can meet to brainstorm solutions to ongoing crises, learn of community resources and get support when under stress. All is confidential.

Please contact either Carrie Larson or John Schmidt if you or someone you know needs help and please consider making a contribution to the Family Assistance Ministry.

Kairos Prison Ministry International, Inc. (Kairos) is a lay-led, interdenominational Christian ministry in

which men and women volunteers bring Christ's love and forgiveness to prisoners and their families. The Kairos programs take the participants on a journey that demonstrates the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ. Kairos Prison Ministry is Christian in nature, although no religious affiliation is necessary to be a participant. The programs involve a structured model that includes the weekend experience, followed by guests or, as our Coxsackie Kairos team refers to them, "residents",

gathering regularly for accountability, support and prayer. A good view of the weekend experience is available on the video at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=pkyGRSZ4sXM, if you haven't already seen it. Volunteers in our area serve mainly at Coxsackie Correctional Facility, a maximum level prison or at Greene CF, a medium level facility. George Herrick is our team leader and has many years of experience with Kairos. Please see George with any questions about this valuable ministry and/or to volunteer to serve in this ministry.

CROP WALK 2022

The war in Ukraine and the impact of severe weather events such as extreme heat, drought and flooding has dramatically increased the number of hungry people in the world. The United Nations World Food Program estimates that as many as 50 million people in 43 countries are nearing famine. The funds we raise this year ensure Church World Service (CWS) can continue responding to the growing needs around the world. CWS is

already responding in drought-stricken areas of Kenya providing emergency food rations to 3,000 families, coupling that aid by working with community leaders to implement disaster risk reduction projects. Your generosity allows CWS to support communities during the times in which they need it most.

Please plan to join the Castleton Crop Walk on **Sunday, October 16.** One-quarter of all funds will be directed to the Anchor Food Pantry and Thrift Store in Castleton. Three-



quarters of the funds help support the work of CWS and its partners for hunger relief and development projects in the U.S. and around the world. Walkers may register at www.crophungerwalk.org/castletonny. Walkers ask friends and families to support them either with an on-line contribution or check payable to "CWS/CROP." On the day of the walk, we will meet at Emmanuel Reformed Church at 12:00 noon for a light lunch, a blessing, some pictures and then we will set out for the parking lot on Boltwood Avenue, behind the Anchor Food Pantry. October 9 - What to do when climate change feels unstoppable by Clover Hogan


October 23 - Why humans are so bad at thinking about climate change by Dr. M. Sanjayan
