FROM OUR PASTOR'S DESK



His very last name!

"I'm Danyal. What's your name?" and the relationship begins as soon as the person responds. In the next move, I will save her/his name in my cellphone. Then, I will be able to call him when I need her/his help. Knowing people begins with learning their names. Knowing people's name opens a new chapter in our lives. It can lead us to redemption or damnation. It depends on the name that we call.

When he was born, the world touched the presence of God. It made the world very excited. The world shouted **God Is With Us**. And so the world called him: **Emmanuel**. Emmanuel means God is with us.

When he was walking on the earth, the world saw a shining light in the horizon. It made the world very excited. The world shouted **God Is Salvation**. And so the world called him: **Jesus**. Jesus means God is salvation.

When he was healing wounds and pains, the world saw a savior. It made the world very excited. The world shouted **Save Us Now**. And so the world called him: **Hosanna**. Hosanna means save us now.

When he was resurrected, the world found itself in Him and Him in itself. It made the world very excited. The world did not only shout His name this time but received Him as well. First, God became flash. Then, **His Body** became the **Bread of Life** and **His blood** became the sign of a new covenant: **The Covenant of Love**. It made the world very excited. The world shouted **Means of Grace**. And so the world called him: **Holy Communion**. Holy Communion is one of the means of grace. Baptism is the other one.

Jesus was called with many names. However, Holy Communion was the most recent name for Jesus. Holy Communion is his very last name. First time, he called himself with this name at the table of the Last Supper.

This very last name contains the other names too. Emmanuel, Hosanna, and Jesus all are summed in Holy Communion. Indeed, Holy Communion is the presence of God or God is with us or Emmanuel. And it is Hosanna for

Holy Communion saves us. And finally Holy Communion is Jesus for communion leads to salvation.

He wants to be remembered by this very last name, Holy Communion. "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me," Jesus said at the table of the Last Supper. It's not a surprise then, that Jesus reenacts communion, a shared meal, there on the shore of the Sea of Galilee even after his resurrection. His friends found him on a beach. "Come and have breakfast," he bids them. He breaks bread and stretches out his hands. Holy Communion replaces estrangement with community: a community of God and creation, of Jesus and his friends, of Jesus and his names. And in remembrance of Him, and to feel God's presence and God's redemptive action in our lives, we will gather on Easter Sunday and we will break bread together.

SOME NOTES ABOUT WORSHIP FOR APRIL



The days in this April are a turning point for the church. The Lenten Season culminates in the crucifixion and death of Jesus. Then, a very short time later, Easter, we have the resurrection of Jesus and, as it is told in Luke 24, his walk, with two men, from Jerusalem to Emmaus. He was not recognized for who he was until he later blessed their evening meal. Thus begins some great events in the story of the risen Christ. It was like a turn in the road. When you make the turn, a whole new vista opens up.

Here is more on the individual Sundays and other dates of the month:

April 2 Palm Sunday -- Holy Communion will be part of both Sunday services. The 9:30 am service will be preceded by a Palm Parade led by our Sunday School students.

Pastor Danyal's theme: Crucified with the Outlaws; Jesus dies as a criminal, hung on a cross between two outlaws. In death Jesus continues to identify with the lowly.

April 6 Holy Thursday – 6:00 pm Supper followed by Holy Communion and an evening worship service. All activity in the Fellowship Hall. All this will be followed by a Prayer Vigil, in the sanctuary, until the Good Friday evening service.

April 7 Good Friday - 7:00pm -8:00pm Worship Service featuring the "Harvest of Sorrows" choral cantata.

April 9 Easter - There will be a Sunrise Service in the Outdoor Chapel at 6:30 am and our regular Morning Worship service at 9:30 am in the sanctuary. The Sunrise service will be inside if there is bad weather. There is no 8:30 am service this week.

Pastor Danyal's theme: The Crucified and Resurrected Life; The Resurrection is God's final act of lifting up the lowly. In the Resurrection, Jesus defeats death and evil.

April 16 2nd Sunday of Easter

Pastor Danyal's theme: The Doubting Thomas side of our personality

April 23 3rd Sunday of Easter New people will be received into membership on this Sunday. Native American Ministries Sunday, Festival of God's Creation.

Pastor Danyal's theme: The Emmaus Walk

April 25 World Malaria Day (Tues)

April 30 4th Sunday of Easter

Pastor Danyal's theme: The Shepherding Sunday



STORYTELLING NIGHT - "WAS", "IS" AND "WILL BE"



This, March 1, **WAS** our second Story Telling Night. We were supposed to feature East Greenbush Town Police Chief Elaine Rudzinski. She was unable to be with us but did send a very capable substitute, Sergeant Ernest A. Tubbs. His informative presentation told us much about the East Greenbush Police Department, who they are and what role they play in our community. He began with the array of equipment you see when you





first take a look at a town police officer. Then he went on to describe the operation of the department. At the end of his presentation, he answered audience questions. The last minutes of the story presentation that night were given to the K9 part of the Police Department, Officer Witko and *Bear*.

K9 Bear is a 3-year-old German Shepherd from Hungary. Bear was purchased from Shallow Creek Kennels in Pennsylvania. He was a "green dog" meaning that he had no training on him. Now he is trained as a dual-purpose police patrol dog. This includes tracking, apprehension, building searches, area searches, obedience and most importantly, narcotics detection. Back in 2021 Officer Edward Josh Witko was given the approval to start researching fundraising opportunities to bring back the East Greenbush Police Department K9 program which was disbanded back in 2007 with the retirement of Sergeant Rick Kemner and K9 Artis. Officer Witko was fortunate enough to find grants and donations to cover the initial startup and to pay for all the needed tools and equipment. The K9 program is now up and running and Officer Witko and Bear are both fully trained now as a team.

K9 Bear and Officer Witko are currently on the afternoon shift 3:00 pm -11:00 pm. They are still a part of patrol and answer regular service calls as needed. They routinely assist other officers with clearing buildings and doing narcotics detection on vehicles. They are also routinely called to assist other agencies such as Rensselaer PD and Schodack PD. As a K9 team they are required by law to continuously train in all of the disciplines to ensure they are able to complete all of their duties. They train twice a month and often break or wear down equipment after a while. They are completely funded through donations and grants. Over time the K9 fund has been slowly decreasing. All donations received go directly to the K9 fund and this money is used for training equipment, leashes, kennel supplies, repairs to our K9 vehicle, medical supplies, safety equipment, collars and many more small items that are used daily.

The town has a fund set up in the name of "East Greenbush Police K9 Fund". If you would like to support *Bear* and that fund, donations can be made via a written check payable to the "Town of East Greenbush" with "K9 fund" in the memo line. Checks can be sent to: East Greenbush Police Department, 225 Columbia Turnpike, Rensselaer, NY 12144.

UNITED METHODIST CHURCH MEETINGS

The first of two **Special Sessions of The Upper New York Conference** was held March 25 via Zoom. A second Special Session is scheduled to be held on **October 14, 2023**. Both sessions have disaffiliation requests as the focus of their agendas. For the Saturday, March 25 session, the following eighteen churches filed requests: (name and district)

With approximately six hundred people voting, all of the requests were granted. The special session did not determine, and it was not the task of the Special Session to determine what direction these churches would follow when they separate from The United Methodist Church.

The Fourteenth Session of the Upper New York Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church will be held June 1-3, 2023, in person in Syracuse.

In honor of the 53rd Earth Day, we present an excerpt from the 2016 United Methodist Social Principles, ¶ 160, 1. The Natural World, The Introduction:



"All creation is the Lord's, and we are responsible for the ways in which we use and abuse it. Water, air, soil, minerals, energy resources, plants, animal life, and space are to be valued and conserved because they are God's creation and not solely because they are useful to human beings. God has granted us stewardship of creation. We should meet these stewardship duties through acts of loving care and respect. Economic, political, social, and technological developments have increased our human numbers, and lengthened and enriched our lives. However, these developments have led to regional defoliation, dramatic extinction of species, massive human suffering, overpopulation, and misuse and overconsumption of natural and nonrenewable resources, partic-

ularly by industrialized societies. This continued course of action jeopardizes the natural heritage that God has entrusted to all generations. Therefore, let us recognize the responsibility of the church and its members to place a high priority on changes in economic, political, social, and technological lifestyles to support a more ecologically equitable and sustainable world leading to a higher quality of life for all of God's creation."
