This year marks the tenth year that our church will be participating in Change the World. This is a program designed to get church folks out of their pews and into the community. It's really nothing new. Some call it putting your faith in action. Our congregation has been reaching out spreading God's love for **150** years now, and of course Christians have been involved for over 2,000 years.

Over the past 10 years we have visited shut-ins, built picnic tables for an area shelter, provided meals for the homeless, brightened up the lives of nursing home residents with flowers, done yardwork, made and delivered greeting cards to those who were hospitalized, donated food to area food pantries, worked in the former Goff Garden next to the church, and remembered the poverty-stricken families in Appalachia with shoeboxes full of basic necessities.

This May will be no exception. <u>We are excited to begin a new</u> partnership with our latest Mission Field: Van Rensselaer Heights, a HUD-subsidized low-income senior housing facility located at 460 Forbes Avenue in Rensselaer. On Change the World Sunday, May 21, following an abbreviated worship service, we will plan on meeting our newest brothers and sisters during a get-together from 10:30 am -11:30 am at Van Rensselaer Heights. Car Pooling is available. Refreshments will be provided and our talented choir will lead a sing-along of some favorite hymns. Will you join us? We will return to church at Noon for a delicious luncheon provided by our Youth.

Many folks enjoyed April's Storytelling Event with East Greenbush Town Historian Bobbie Reno. She spoke

about the life and history of Edmonia Lewis, born in Greenbush, NY. Edmonia, of Native American and African American descent, moved to England and there became a world famous sculptor, with works in the Smithsonian and elsewhere. She was truly a woman of much talent and perseverance.

Ms. Reno through her hard work has had a USPS stamp created with Edmonia Lewis on it and helped find and restore the grave where Ms. Lewis is buried. Lastly, she also had Oberlin College grant Ms. Lewis her college degree as she was wrongly dismissed during her lifetime.

Very inspiring stories of both Edmonia's life and Bobbie's mission to have the world know Edmonia Lewis. Thanks to all who came to this event and again to Bobbie Reno for taking the time to share the story with us .

SOME NOTES ABOUT WORSHIP FOR MAY

This month of May we will celebrate Aldersgate Day. That day is an anniversary observed by Methodist Christians on **May 24.** It recalls the day in 1738 when Church of England priest John Wesley attended a [Moravian] group meeting in Aldersgate, London...

But first, let us go back to 1735 and hear what The Methodist Church in the United Kingdom has to say about an early meeting of John Wesley and members of the Moravian community.

[The brothers] John and Charles Wesley set out for America in 1735, enthused at the idea of preaching the Gospel to Native American people.



During the voyage the ship was struck by a terrifying storm. John was afraid. He prayed with the English passengers. . . Shortly afterwards he was at another service with a group of German Moravians when a huge wave engulfed the ship and water poured down into the cabins. . . While the English passengers screamed in terror, the Moravians continued singing - men, women and children seemingly untroubled.

Later he asked one of the Moravians if they hadn't been afraid. He replied that not even the women and children had been afraid. . . John knew that they had something he didn't, an absolute trust in God. . . John was deeply impressed. . .

Now 1738. The story may best be told by a Wesley journal entry for May 24, 1738.

In the evening I went very unwillingly to a [Moravian] society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's Preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation, and an assurance was given me that he had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death.

It was this experience that changed his life and ultimately lead to the development of the Methodist movement in Britain, Ireland, and America. . .

- May 21 7th Sunday of Easter Ascension Sunday, Heritage Sunday Change the World Sunday. There will be no 8:30 am service. The shortened 9:30 service will be led by the Change The World team.
- May 24 Aldersgate Day
- May 28 Pentecost Sunday Look now to be sure you have something RED to wear to church this Sunday. Pastor Danyal's theme: The history of the Spirit from Genesis to Acts; a journey from the Old Testament to the New Testament.

Tradition for United Methodists includes John Wesley's Three Simple Rules for living faithfully: **First**, do no harm; **Second**, do all the good you can; and **Third**, stay in love with God. Facing climate change and the call of the Three Simple Rules, the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church wrote the 2009 Pastoral Letter, God's Renewed Creation: Call to Hope and Action, [an excerpt from the Bishops' letter follows].

"...let us live and act in hope. As people in the tradition of John Wesley, we understand reconciliation and renewal to be part of the process of salvation that is already underway. We are not hemmed-in to a fallen world. Rather we are part of a divine unfolding process to which we must contribute. As we faithfully respond to God's grace and call to action, the Holy Spirit guides us in this renewal. With a resurrection spirit, we look forward to the renewal of the whole creation and commit ourselves to that vision. We pray that God will accept and use our lives and resources that we rededicate to a ministry of peace, justice, and hope to overcome poverty and disease, environmental degradation, and the proliferation of weapons and violence."
