Why am I following Christ in the Methodist tradition?



June 28 is John Wesley's 320th birthday. In the mid-18th century the calendar was changed in England. Ten days were dropped off the calendar. This was to bring England into uniformity with the rest of the world who had made the change to the Gregorian calendar in 1582. This changed John Wesley's birth date to June 28. This year, we will celebrate his birthday on the June 25 Sunday Service by singing a couple of his brother's hymns (Charles Wesley), contemplating on the tenants

of Wesleyan theology, and of course enjoying his birthday cake.

Also, George will blow out candles on top of his birthday cake. You may ask why George? Well, it was not my decision. Actually, it was Wesley's wish. In 1786, John Wesley wrote in the opening paragraph of *Thoughts Upon Methodism*: "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid, lest they should only exist as, having the form of religion without the power. And this undoubtedly will be the case, unless they hold fast both the doctrine, spirit, and discipline with which they first set out."

We have many saints in our church, many saints with different marvelous gifts. I'm so glad that God appointed George to be the beacon of Methodism in the FUMC. He does not let us be a "a dead sect" as far as Wesley was concerned. George's knowledge of the Wesleyan movement and his passion for the denomination are fascinating but none of them will make him unique. His actions make him a unique Methodist disciple of



Christ, a Methodist who "hold(s) fast both the doctrine, spirit, and discipline with which Methodists first set out" as John Wesley wished.

June would be a good opportunity for us to think about this question: Why am I a Methodist? Mr. Y who always sits in the back row responds: "Because my parents and my grandparents were Methodists." Mrs. X who attends the church Bible study says: "One reason I live out my discipleship as a Methodist is the Wesleyan balance between God's providence on one hand and human freedom on the other." Mrs. X asserts Methodists don't believe that God has a reason for everything. Rather, Methodists believe in the God who loves us enough to give us the freedom to reject that love; the God who is relentlessly at work to fulfill his saving purpose for us while never abrogating the freedom he planted within us; the God who invites everyone — not just a predestined few — to receive his love and grace in Jesus Christ.





Q who recently asked to be addressed as "their" and not "she" or "he" responds differently to the question. Q said, "I'm a follower of Christ in the Methodist tradition because of the Wesleyan balance of personal piety with social action." Q believes that personal piety is the way we breathe in and social action is the way we breathe out. The Methodists have always agreed with the epistle of James that faith without works is dead. The inner transformation of the heart must be expressed through social transformation of the world in which we live.

My personal reason for following Christ in the Methodist tradition is the balance between present and future salvation. Methodists believe that God's salvation is not a static thing. It's not a form of spiritual vaccination. We don't just "get saved" and then sit around waiting to go to heaven. Salvation is a living, growing, dynamic relationship in which God forgives and heals the brokenness in our lives, relationships and in the whole creation so that we participate in God's transformation of the world.

Salvation begins now and continues throughout our lives. Wesley used the word "sanctification" to describe the ongoing process by which the grace of God is constantly at work in us to shape our lives into the likeness of Christ. The work begins here and continues within us until it is fulfilled in heaven.

One of Charles Wesley's greatest hymns (UMH 384) begins in the way God's love meets us in the present:

Love divine, all loves excelling,
Joy of heaven to earth come down;
Fix in us thy humble dwelling;
All thy faithful mercies crown!
Jesus, Thou art all compassion,
Pure unbounded love Thou art;
Visit us with Thy salvation;
Enter every trembling heart.

It begins right here, right now, when we experience the love of God in our hearts. But the last verse of the hymn points to the way that love continues to be at work within us all the way to heaven.


Finish, then, Thy new creation;
Pure and spotless let us be.
Let us see Thy great salvation
Perfectly restored in Thee;
Changed from glory into glory,
Till in heaven we take our place,
Till we cast our crowns before Thee,
Lost in wonder, love, and praise.

My prayer is that faith, working in us through that "love divine all loves excelling," will fulfill God's new creation in and through "the people called Methodist" in our time. Amen!

Later in the month we will celebrate John Wesley's birthday. This happy occasion will be the focus of Pastor Danyal's sermon on **June 25**. Wesley was a dedicated journalist. In 1774, he wrote;

"This being my birthday, the first day of my seventy-second year, I was considering. How is this, that I find just the same strength as I did thirty years ago? That my sight is considerably better now and my nerves firmer than there were then? That I have none of the infirmities of old age and have lost several I had in my youth? The

grand cause is the good pleasure of God, who doth whatsoever pleaseth him. The chief means are: (1) My constantly rising at four, for about fifty years. (2) My generally preaching at five in the morning, one of the most healthy exercises in the world. (3) My never travelling less, by sea or land, than four thousand five hundred miles in a year."

The first Sunday in June is Peace with Justice Sunday. Every year, on the First Sunday after Pentecost, United Methodists celebrate this day by collecting a special offering. Administered by the General Board of Church



and Society (GBCS), the offering benefits peace with justice ministries in the annual conference and around the world.

A portion of our gifts supports the work of GBCS. The agency awards grants to ministries that do vital peace with justice work in many places around the world. GBCS distributes three different grants available to United Methodist congregations and organizations. The grants support ethnic/minority local church ministries, as well as programs related to the

denomination's Human Relations Day and Peace with Justice Sunday. The board connects with conferences, agencies and other networks to educate, equip and mobilize actions in support of economic, health and gender justice.

Peace with Justice Sunday is a faithful expression of shalom in the Bible. It calls the church to strengthen its capacity to advocate publicly in communities and nations throughout the world. It aims to make shalom visible and active in people's lives and communities. When we celebrate Peace with Justice Sunday, we witness to God's demand for a faithful, just, disarmed and secure world.

Some quick notes about the video: Start listening at about 9 minutes. Don't skip Pastor Sara's introduction of Bishop Oliveto. For example, she said Bishop Karen is one of the reasons she has for hope in The United Methodist Church. The Bishop's early comments are about hopelessness. Then the audience got a chance to The Bishop's next comments include some about The Statue of Liberty. Interesting thoughts. Later she talks about taking one hour a day "to play" (which, for her, includes learning new magic tricks) and then asks the question of all of us, "How do you play?" Again the audience got a chance to respond. The last major part of the morning was when the audience got a chance to question the Bishop about "anything". Skip to about 2.02 on the video and you can hear me asking about youth in the church.
