A practical faith!

As I continue my studies for the ordained ministry, I am particularly excited by the writings of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism. Wesley's emphasis on practical theology urges us to put faith and love into practice. This is our distinctive heritage as United Methodists. In fact, the Book of Discipline declares, "the Spirit has brought the Church into existence for the healing of the nations."

In Wesleyan theology, living the full Christian life consists of two parts: first, seeking inward holiness through prayer, Scripture, Holy Communion, and faithful worship, and second, putting faith and those or

faithful worship, and second, putting faith and these good works into practice.



John Wesley's theology is known as practical theology among theologians. Hence, Methodists can be identified as practical Christians. The starting point of salvation in Wesley's theology is prevenient grace, or "God's action" in human life. This "divine love" surrounds all people, Christians and non-Christians, sinners and righteous people. Wesley believes the conscience is a gift from God. He said conscience is the Holy Spirit at work in everyone. He says God's grace awakens the conscience in all humans, to move them from sin toward repentance and faith. Would this notion change our attitude towards others? Would recognizing God's presence in people who trespass against us help us to enter into the healing path of forgiveness? Prevenient grace is God's intention for forgiveness



and reconciling for all. And all means all. It is for the lost coin, lost sheep, and the prodigal child. God does not exclude anyone from His inclusive grace, someone even like a drunk driver who killed a four-year-old kid.

In addition, prevenient grace makes it possible for all persons to receive God's justifying grace.

Justification is God's accepting and forgiving love, which comes with assurance of our salvation. Wesley declares justifying and assuring grace occur when human beings yield their lives to God, in gratitude. It is the individual's faithful response to God's prevenient grace.

The next step in the Christian's journey is sanctification. Sanctifying grace draws humans toward the gift of Christian perfection, which Wesley describes as "having the mind of Christ and walking as he walked." Sanctifying grace nurtures the Wesleyan passion for social holiness. Wesley's outdoor preaching, visiting of prisoners, and ministry among the poor are based on his understanding of prevenient grace as universal and available to all, regardless of social or economic status, religion, race, or gender. He wanted to reduce suffering and make the world a more just and compassionate place. Thus, he articulates a theology in which the church, as body of Christ, heals all nations regardless of differences in race, language, and beliefs. Are we in the mission of healing the nations? Are we in the business of forgiveness and practicing the art of letting go? Are we part of church, the body of Christ, or another entity? I pray we all are part of Jesus' second coming to the world. Amen!



STORYTELLING SEPTEMBER AND OCTOBER

At our Storytelling Event on September 6, State Entomologist Dr. Timothy McCabe talked about a trip that he



and six other biologists made in the mid-1980's to Neblina, the Mountain of the Mists, in Southern Venezuela. He showed slides illustrating the challenges of getting to and working in this remote area, which is a preserve of the Yanomami people. As it turned out, the group was trapped on the mountain and unable to get out for more than a month because the helicopter transporting them couldn't fly. Despite the fact they had almost no food, their scientific collections and studies continued (they were, after all, biologists!), and Tim had slides with examples of the orchids, snakes, and caterpillars they observed. Fortunately, they were eventually rescued, though it took many months to recover physically. The experience has not

stopped Tim from continuing his scientific expeditions to remote regions around the world.

The October "Storytelling Night" has been cancelled. In lieu of this, Pastor Danyal is inviting the congregation for a night of reconciliation and healing with Jon Romano. During the week we had several activities, some repeating like the morning and evening concerts.



Our group met both bands and got some pictures with them, after one group stopped by our room around midnight on the last day we were there. There were a large variety of activities, ranging from

The shops and restaurants around were also very friendly, when Victor and I stopped by just after they cleaned up, they gave us some fries and some milkshakes for free. (Victor loved getting 50 crowns in a trash bag a nice lady gave him.) Over all the other things, we loved how good the people who preached and taught us things throughout our sessions and sacrificing their own time for us to learn more about our faith. We all felt resonance with our faith and God; beyond the regular talk about God and his influence on our lives. We EX-PERIENCED it at work, in our lives and used his actions to the fullest. We had some of the best fun we've had ever.

And one more experience. These are some brief thoughts from Victor Giso:

The youth 2023 event was held in Daytona Beach, Florida on July 25th-28th. Youth 2023 was amazing all around, from the beautiful sunrise over the ocean from our beachfront hotels, to the incredible worship band, Youth 2023 was a breathtaking event. We were invited to receive communion on the beach and participated in interactive workshops. The people there were so welcoming and so amped up on Jesus. It was very moving to see over 2,500 youth worshiping Jesus. There are so many youth out there who are on fire for God.
