THE WISE MEN'S NEW YEAR RESOLUTION

The image of the wise men on the Christmas cards is different than what we have in the Bible. We call them three kings, but they were not kings. Actually, they were spiritual leaders. The term Magi is a plural form of magoi in Greek language, which means Zoroastrian priests. They were neither kings nor wise men. Maybe they earned the title wise men because of their skills in interpreting dreams and understanding astrology. They were scholars of their day and enjoyed access to the Persian emperor.



Zoroastrianism is one of the oldest religions in the world which is still active in Iran today. It was the official religion of Persia or Iran before Islam. The primary prophet for Zoroastrianism is Zoroaster. Zoroastrians believe that he was conceived in the womb of a 15-year-old Persian virgin. Like Jesus, Zoroaster started his ministry at age of 30 after he defeated all Satan's temptations. He predicts that "other virgins would conceive additional divinely appointed prophets as history unfolded."

Zoroastrian priests believe that they could foretell these miraculous births by reading the stars. Like the Jews, Zoroastrian priests were anticipating the birth of the true Savior. Matthew tells us that Zoroastrian priests or wise men followed the star of Bethlehem to Jesus' birthplace to assure his audience that Jesus is a fulfillment not only of Old Testament prophecy of the virgin birth, but also Zoroastrian virgin birth prophecies: Jesus is the light for all nations.

Matthew tells us about a spiritual journey of three Zoroastrian priests. Matthew tells us seeking light is a journey. It can be a long journey but whoever seeks the light will find it. They ride camels for 20 days to find God and to honor him, to adore him, and to worship him. It indicates that there is no end in the spiritual journey on earth. People are always passengers who move from one level of spirituality to another level. Even clergies, priests, spiritual leaders they should seek God in every moment of their lives.

The Persian man, the Arabian man, and the Indian man ride camels for 20 days to find God and honor him, to adore him, and to worship him. It indicates that God does not belong to a specific nation. God belongs to anyone who seeks him. It does not matter where you are from and which language you speak: you are from Israel and speak Hebrew, from Persia

and speak Farsi, or from Arabia and speak Arabic. The question is what do you offer to God? It does not matter what is your nationality. The question is, what have you done? Are your hands empty, or have you something to offer to God? The three wise men are from different countries different nationality they speak in different languages but all of them can communicate with Jesus. All of them brought something. The language of faith is not Hebrew. The language of faith is not English. The language of faith is not Greek or Persian. Love is the language of faith. When we see God, we don't speak with words, we speak with our heart, so make sure you have enough love in your heart because God does not speak English and words are not helpful. We will speak with our hearts when we meet God. Do we have enough love for God in our hearts?

On Sunday, January 21, the EcoTeam is sponsoring a presentation on "Federal, State and Utility Savings

Available for Clean Energy Improvements." The presentation will be given by Paul Fisk and will be held at 1:30 pm in Room B at the East Greenbush Community Library. Paul Fisk is a trained Climate Reality Project presenter on the causes, effects and solutions for the climate crisis. He is retired from a career in local and state government, having held managerial positions in budgeting and information management. He currently focuses on publicizing the wide array of government and utility financial incentives available to households to save energy and money while

reducing fossil fuel pollution. Tax credits and rebates to weatherize and electrify homes and vehicles, upgrade HVAC systems and appliances, installing solar panels, and other options will be discussed. Clean energy improvements not only will save you money, but will add to your comfort and provide you with a healthier home environment.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

We are so grateful for your continued support of our church and its ministries. Our budget was presented to the Church Council on December 6. The 2024 budget was approved and a summary of it is shown below, as we want to give you an idea of how your gifts are used.

Overall, the pledge campaign was a success in that we received pledge commitments from a total of 85 parishioners realizing a slight increase in revenue (about 1%). However, as you are aware, our overall expenses are increasing at a higher rate than usual.
