A Closer Look at the Crucifixion - and More



Focusing on the magnificence of resurrection can lead us to close our eyes to the wounds of crucifixion. Yes, crucifixion was a traumatic event, not only for Jesus' followers, family, and disciples; but for the human Jesus who suffered on the cross. The vision of the naked, humiliated, suffering, bleeding Jesus who experienced fear and trauma is one we hear of often. We have heard it from the disciples' viewpoints frequently, but what would be Jesus' narrative? How did he experience it? Wasn't his resurrected body a

response to the trauma he endured at the hands of others? Why did the resurrected Jesus keep the scars from his crucifixion? He could have had any resurrected body he desired, and yet he chose one identifiable, mainly by his scars, that could be seen and touched.

Jesus' suffering was without question, intense. Jesus also rose again from that dark place of abuse and oppression, showing us we too can rise and heal. He was tortured, mocked, stripped, beaten, spit upon, and ultimately crucified — which was one of the worst forms of death in the ancient world. Matthew 27:27-30 gives us a clear view in which Jesus suffered physical, spiritual, sexual, and emotional abuse. Was Jesus sexually abused? Sexual abuse is not limited to forced physical touch, but includes any nonconsensual exposure, which was part of Jesus' torture on that Thursday evening and Friday morning. Sexual abuse can be for the purpose of power, control, and humiliation. Jesus was forcibly stripped naked and publicly exposed for the purpose of power, control, and humiliation—fitting within the definition of sexual abuse.



Yes, our Christ knows trauma first-hand. He knows not only the physical pain of trauma, but he knows the psychological stress of impending threats, too. In the Garden of Gethsemane, as Jesus anticipates the coming crucifixion, He sweats drops of blood (Luke 22:44). The sufferer of trauma has far more in common with their savior than they might have thought.

Christ not only experienced trauma, but he bears the wounds of his suffering, eternally indicating that trauma is a wound that never fully heals... but it does not mean that we will never receive a new life, a new beginning, in which we can experience happiness, peace, and joy again. The wounds on His resurrected body are also a means of demonstrating solidarity with sufferers. He bears the marks of his trauma, so that the victims of trauma will know they have solidarity with Jesus Christ, their Savior. He knows about the impact of trauma. He cares about our wounds.

He bears in his body the wounds of his own past so that they might help us to believe in his compassion and gain a deep understanding. The wounds are not surface level scars, they remain gaping holes. Jesus' scars are real and tangible, so much so that the doubting Thomas could place his finger in the holes that were in Jesus'

hands. Perhaps, Thomas is a symbol of people or events that could trigger Jesus' PTSD.



God grants new life, new earth, and new heaven to all believers. However, there are many things that the victim of trauma will need to work through in the process of healing and recovery. There is no short-circuiting the hard work of processing and integrating traumatic memories, nor of stabilizing symptoms. Yet, a vital key for all that hard work is the amazing power of Divine support, that reveals itself through flesh-and-blood people, safe friends and family, trained counselors, who can help

individuals and be present in the moment, and medications.

The pews of the church are filled with members whose bodies bear the burden of trauma from painful experiences. Some of us might suffer in silence, without speaking about our pain to anyone. Tears slide silently down our cheeks over the sacrament tray, sometimes we weep when we return home from worship. Even if we never see the tears, those who live with trauma are there, all around us. Perhaps this is you.

Jesus' divine mission included reaching out to those who have been and will be traumatized. Until she touched the hem of his cloak, the woman with an issue of blood suffered the trauma of an incurable chronic illness for twelve years, spending all her money on physicians who could not cure her. Jesus' response to her was, "Daughter, be of good comfort: thy faith hath made thee whole; go in peace" (Luke 8:43–48). Her inability to be healed was a matter of inadequate medicine, not insufficient faith. He dispelled his disciples' moral suspicions about a man with congenital blindness, saying, "Neither hath this man sinned, nor his parents" (John 9:3). Jesus did not stigmatize anyone for a disability. It is not easy to perceive trauma unless we know what we're looking for, and developing a discerning eye and compassionate heart for trauma survivors has the potential to change how we minister in the church. Since 2023, our congregation has started to make room for trauma healing at the church. It is the way that we understand the resurrection and offer it to all: the wounded body of Christ rose again from that dark place of abuse and oppression, and you too can rise in healing. Come and see!

Here are more of the details for each Sunday and other days in March:

March 1 – World Day of Prayer

March 3 – Third Sunday in Lent

We will contemplate Psalm 23 and the question: Finding Jesus as Our Shepherd.

March 10 – Fourth Sunday in Lent UMCOR Sunday

We will contemplate Psalm 110 and the question: Finding Jesus as Our Hope.

March 17 – *Fifth Sunday in Lent*

We will contemplate Psalm 69 and the question: Finding Jesus as Our Strength.

March 24 – Passion/Palm Sunday

We will contemplate Psalm 22 and the question: Finding Jesus as Our Savior.

March 28 – Maundy Thursday

Maundy Thursday service will be from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm. The service begins with the opening prayer and choir anthem followed by the ritual of hand washing, Mediterranean meals prepared by Pastor Danyal, Holy Communion, reading the scriptures related to the passion of Christ, and singing hymns. This **entire service and meal** will be held in the Fellowship Hall.

March 29 – Good Friday

The service will begin at 7:00 pm. There will be a very short introduction to worship followed by our church choir singing the cantata "From Silence to Song" by Joseph M. Martin.

March 31 - Easter: Worship this Sunday will begin with the Sunrise Service outdoors in the Chapel in the Woods at 6:30 am. There will be NO 8:30 am service. The main Sunday worship service will be held in the sanctuary at 9:30 am. Pastor Danyal will lead us in contemplating John 20:24-31 and the question: Why did the resurrected Jesus keep the scars from his crucifixion?

A KITCHEN UPDATE: Our church kitchen is continuously being used. But things need to be updated and repaired. The kitchen needs to be painted and cabinets need to be replaced as some are broken. We have



repaired the commercial dishwasher - \$1,700 to get it usable for the Madrigal Dinner and Spaghetti Dinner. The United Women in Faith paid \$500 towards the bill. For the island cabinet near the microwave we have a quote from Curtis Lumber of \$5,745. The drawers stick and the mold has permeated the cabinet. The sink cabinet will cost \$3,973. Both will match the new cabinet. The wall cabinet

was painted with latex over oil and inside is peeling, plus the hardware is rusted and hard to adjust the shelving. The counter with the coffee Bunn machine needs repairing and the whole room needs painting. If you ever have renovated a kitchen you can understand the high cost of paint, cabinet, service repair. The UWIF needs help with raising funds for all this. There are donation envelopes in the bulletin once a month, the profits from Easter Pie sale will go towards the project. A portion of the Thrift Sale profits will go towards the kitchen and in December we will hold a roast beef dinner and the profits from this event will also go towards the kitchen repair,. 
STORYTELLING NIGHT CONTINUES

LIFE AS A SCIENTIST: CHALLENGING, FRUSTRATING AND FUN

We gathered together in Fellowship Hall on the evening of February 6. The smell of delicious coffee and snacks greeted us. Joe Collins, now in his early 90's, is a friend to many, a scholar, a chemist, a spiritually mature man and an author.

Joe shared the story of his complicated, challenging life as a chemist interested in the spatial structures of natural molecules and the role of water in providing spatial order in living cells. Joe mentioned nothing of his awards and accolades, or patents. Rather, he shared memories of him and Betty living in many different academic and pharmaceutical settings so he could earn a living following his passion of studying how molecules interact with each other. Joe showed hand made stick models of different molecule structures as he chronicled work, failure, more work, recalcitrant supervisors, bosses both poor and brilliant and success.



Joe's most recent publication "The Matrix of Life: A View of Natural Molecules from the Perspective of Environmental Water" was published in 2023. Joe shared his hope that some young chemist will read this book and continue the research on... "the amazing way natural molecules formed and evolved to give us life" (Paraphrased).




NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL AREA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The General Fund is the account that receives funds from offerings, building use and other income and pays the expenses of the church including staff costs, building maintenance, utilities, program costs, and connectional fees. As with your own family income and expenses, we need to have our income keep pace with our expenses so that we maintain some funds in our General Fund from month to month so that we can pay all of our bills. There are bequest funds and endowment funds that are not included in the General Fund. Bequest funds can be borrowed against if the General Fund gets too low. The Endowment funds generate interest that can be used for special projects and bequest funds are usually used for one time expenses.



The columns in the graph above show the year to date (YTD) cash flow in and out of the General Fund for 2023 and 2024 and use the scale on the left of the graph. The lines in the graph show the General Fund Balance at the end of the month for 2023 and 2024 and use the scale on the right of the graph. The graph shows the performance of the General Fund in 2023 and 2024. It clearly shows that income has not always kept up with our expenses over the last year.

We will be posting updates to this graph monthly. You have an opportunity to influence what this graph will look like for the remainder of 2024 by what you contribute to the church this year. Please prayerfully consider making an additional gift as you are able to help us meet the church's financial obligations this year.

Everyone who been following the national news over the past months knows of the great political divisions in our country. All the more reason for all those who are eligible to vote this year to exercise that right. In our Methodist tradition, here are six women who fought for that vote, and more.

Sojourner Truth (1797-1883) born a slave, "a woman with a powerful passion for equality."

Frances Willard (1839-1898) said "Lips that touch liquor shall never touch mine." But that was only part of who she was.

The Rev. Anna Howard Shaw (1847-1919) One of the first women granted a license to preach by the Methodist Episcopal Church. The second woman to graduate from Boston University School of Theology.

Mary McLeod Bethune (1875-1955) She founded Bethune-Cookman University in Daytona Beach, Florida. She lead the way in desegregating the American Red Cross and Women's Army Auxiliary Corps.

Jessie Daniel Ames (1883-1972) She played a key role in getting Texas to become the first state in the South to ratify the women's vote. She was the founder of the Association of Southern Women for the Prevention of Lynching.

Dorothy Height (1912-2010) The "Godmother" and Unsung Leader of the Civil Rights Movement. Her hard work helped pass the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.
