Our Post Easter Color



On Easter, the world identifies us as Christians all clothed in white. However, the day after Easter, we choose a color that speaks to our hearts. We won't be naked, still covered by the Christian cloth, though the color is different. The theology of each denomination is the different color that we pick for our Christian cloth. The theology of each denomination distinguishes the followers of that denomination from the other denominations. We are Methodists which means we follow John Wesley's theology. Wesleyan

theology is based on four interrelated eye-opening sources: scripture, tradition, experience, and reason.

The sacred scriptures are the first source that opens our eyes to experience God in our daily life, in each moment that we breathe. The scriptures tell us that our God is the "God of events: the redeemer from slavery," ¹ the God of Mount Sinai, the God of Good Friday, the God of resurrection and Easter, and the God of salvation. The Old Testament and the New Testament present authentic testimonies of God's grace in different places and times. Hence, the Bible empowers us to talk about God in an authentic way. The Bible teaches us that God the Father is manifesting God's self in events of history through the Holy Spirit and the Son. Hence, as the Book of Discipline presents, Scripture is the first authentic source that illuminates the other resources: tradition, experience and reason.

The tradition is the second authentic source that covers all testimonies between the New Testament age and our own time. The tradition presents wonderful witnesses of our theological foundations. Therefore, tradition is a valuable source "for constructing our own theologies." ²According to the Discipline, traditions lead us to "think about God in new ways, enlarge our vision of shalom, and enhance our confidence in God's provident love."

Biblical tradition teaches us the ways that others understood God's grace in their time. Tradition is a valuable source that invites us to learn from others' wisdom and others' mistakes. We learn from different people who sought Christ in their time, people with different nationalities, different ethnicities, different race, different gender, different sexual orientation, and different sexual identity.

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Experience is the third source in our systematic way of thinking or the Wesleyan theology. This source presents our experiences of encountering God within our particular social context. For John Wesley, experience is the combination of feeling and interpretation. ³ We express our new life in Christ through experience.

Reason is the last source in our systematic way of thinking or the Wesleyan theology. In the Wesleyan theology, "reason reflects on the spiritual data presented to (heart)." We use our reason in reading and interpreting the Scripture. We make a connection between God's will and events that represent God's grace in the world of creation. Reasoning is our ability to observe the life events and then it is our scientific

knowledge and our mental ability to use philosophy for interpreting God's actions. We hope that interpreting God's actions would lead us to God's will. But "our reasoning and our experience are limited because of our human's finitude. Our experience and reasoning need to be corrected by biblical norms." ⁵That's why we put the Scripture at the beginning of our theological sources.

We made the right choice of color for our Christian cloth, didn't we? Methodism looks great on us. What do you think?

SOME NOTES ABOUT WORSHIP FOR APRIL

There are four Sundays in the month of April.

April 7 – *Second Sunday of Easter*

Pastor Danyal's theme: On this second Sunday after Easter, we turn our attention to the community. The readings from Acts 4 and Psalm 133 remind us that living in community means taking care of one another and sharing the abundant blessings of God. The readings from 1 John and John 20 give us a glimpse into the life of this new community of faith. In John, the resurrected Christ comes to a frightened community of his disciples and brings them peace. In 1 John, the community proclaims to be witnesses to life in Christ—that is, followers who live in the light of God. May these stories move us and the communities we serve, that we may walk with the resurrected Christ in the light of God.

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April 14 – *Third Sunday of Easter* Native American Ministries Sunday

Pastor Danyal's theme: Today's scriptures remind us that witnesses to the mighty power of resurrection and new life in Christ Jesus are called to become instruments of God's mighty power of resurrection and new life in Christ Jesus. We, who have witnessed God's miraculous love and impact in our lives, are empowered and challenged to bring this love and impact to the world—even when the world rejects and doubts us.

April 21 – Fourth Sunday of Easter Festival of God's Creation

Pastor Danyal's theme: The stone that was rejected becomes the building's cornerstone in the Acts passage. Despite his crucifixion, Jesus is salvation for all humanity. In beloved Psalm 23, the Lord is represented as a shepherd, foreshadowing the Good Shepherd of the Gospels. The psalmist reminds us to seek comfort and restoration, since all are welcome to the table of the Lord. John 10 and 1 John 3 return us to abide in Christ's resurrection—Christ laid down his life for us, so we must follow his lead. Following the model of Christ, we are to act with charity and love in the world.

April 25 – *World Malaria Day* "...the theme chosen by the World Health Organization for World Malaria Day this year, "Zero malaria," stresses the importance of reaching marginalized populations with the tools and strategies available to reduce and eliminate malaria."



April 28 – Fifth Sunday of Easter

Pastor Danyal's theme: Today's scriptures challenge us to remain in God. Christ promises to be the vine that will strengthen us, as long as we are connected to him. John's letter clarifies that our connection is bonded by love. Remain in God, by remaining in love. Remain in Christ, by sharing the good news of God's love, whether by witnessing and teaching, as Phillip did, or by caring for a brother or sister, as John advises. In this love, we remain in Christ and Christ remains in us.

Pastor Danyal will be preaching each of the Sundays in the month. Holy Communion will be celebrated on the first Sunday of the month. As we head to warmer weather, the early service will now be held at the Chapel in the Woods, weather permitting. Our next meeting is **April 8** at 2:00 pm in room 16. We continue to have new faces at our meeting, yours could be one of them.


STORYTELLING NIGHT CONTINUES

ENDOWMENT FUND UPDATE March 18, 2024

The First United Methodist Church Endowment Fund was started in 1996. Currently, three different funds comprise the Endowment Fund: The General Fund, the Music and Worship Fund, and the Education Fund.



Once each year interest and dividends from the previous year are transferred to the Church. Primarily, this money is directed toward beginning new ministries or expanding existing ministries. This year, at the beginning of March, the Endowment Fund transferred \$8,495.29 to the Church.

EARTH DAY - FESTIVAL OF GOD'S CREATION

The United Methodist Church designates one Sunday each year, preferably the Sunday closest to Earth Day (**April 22** this year), as a **Festival of God's Creation**, celebrating God's gracious work in creating the earth and all living things.

The people of EARTHDAY.ORG have an "unwavering...commitment to end plastics for the sake of human and planetary health, demanding a 60% reduction in the production of ALL plastics by 2040."

That's today. But how did this effort begin? We go back to 1970 and the famous newscaster Walter Cronkite on the CBS News. Click on the link: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=WbwC281uzUs and get the story.

"The United Methodist Church acknowledges the importance of environmental protection as a part of Christians' call to be good stewards

of God's creation while ensuring sustainability for future generations." What part can we play, as individuals, as a church, in the reduction of the use of plastics?

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GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH MEETS THIS MONTH

Planning a big family wedding with dozens of people coming in for a weekend is challenge enough.



But imagine trying to bring more than a thousand people together from four continents for a gathering that lasts two weeks.

They speak 10 languages, have various dietary needs, require multiple hotel rooms and must be able to come together to pray, worship and make decisions that affect millions of United Methodists. Hundreds of these visitors also need visas just to attend.

Making sure United Methodist delegates, bishops and others can come together for the denomination's top legislative assembly is the responsibility of the Commission on the General Conference.

The theme for the gathering will be <u>"...and know that I am God" from Psalm 46.</u>

Kim Simpson, the commission's chair, said that focus on God is critical, es-

pecially in this tumultuous time.

For the past three years, the commission's planning has been hampered by the COVID pandemic and resulting travel complications — leading the commission to postpone General Conference three times. The assembly, originally planned for 2020 in Minneapolis, **is now scheduled for April 23-May 3, 2024,**

in Charlotte, North Carolina.

The coming General Conference is to have 862 voting delegates — 55.9% from the U.S., 32% from Africa, 6% from the Philippines, 4.6% from Europe and the remainder from concordat churches that have close ties to The United Methodist Church. Half are to be clergy and half lay. Bishops preside at General Conference sessions but do not have a vote...

Even under normal circumstances, General Conference often can be a grueling experience where people spend weeks far from home, relying on interpreters for communication and debating issues of faith that they hold dear.

But commission members, throughout their May meeting, remarked that they expected the coming General Conference — with a denominational separation already happening — not to be business as usual.

This year's General Conference will have some difficult decisions to make. One of the major ones is how to relate to members of the LGBTIQ community. Also, what changes, if any, need to be made to the church following the disaffiliation of hundreds of congregations since the last General Conference session.

One of the important pieces of business at this conference is to elect persons to be a Bishop of The United Methodist Church, if there are any vacancies. The number of Bishops to serve in the jurisdiction will already have been decided at General Conference.

- Actively participate in the Council or one of its programs
- Have done outstanding pastoral ministry
- Exemplify racial, gender, and denominational inclusiveness.

Ed Bloch Interfaith Youth Award:

- College or high school age person
- Whose actions have helped build bridges within the interfaith community.

Micah 6:8 Award:

 A person whose actions represent someone who does justice, loves kindness, and walks humbly with their God.
