#### **REPORT ON MAY'S CHANGE THE WORLD (MONTH)**


"Give, and it shall be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over." Luke 6:38.

## ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2024

Forward: Claiming God's Future with Hope and Joy. Philippians 3: 13-14.

This was the theme of the 2024 Annual Conference held May 30-June 2, 2024.

Approximately 400-500 Clergy, Laity, family, and equalization members gathered in Syracuse, NY at the Onondaga Community College. Representatives from churches all over Upper NY were in attendance. Bishop Hector presided over the event, with the support of his staff and Bishop Tracey Smith-Malone. It was a blessing to be in her presence, her call radiated from her presence. Bishop Tracy S. Malone was elected to the episcopacy in 2016. She is the Resident Bishop of the Ohio East Area, which includes the East Ohio Conference in the North Central Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church. Bishop Malone is the first woman of color to be elected as President to the episcopacy.

Although I cannot speak for what happens at clergy session, laity session was a wonderful learning opportunity. Dr. Scott Johnson spoke about the storms we have endured. Storms are part of the light (the hope). God gives us hope, but the storms are always here. A learning session was provided by Dr. Ashley Boggan, reminding us of our Weslyen heritage. She reminded us that our name, *Methodist*, came from meaning in ministry with everyone, at any place, at any time, no matter what. We have a strong tradition of

ministering to those in need. I am so proud of that tradition, so many of us are! I am proud that I see so many in our church ministering, and it's always exciting to see where we will go next.

The youth that attended the Mission of Peace also had an opportunity to present about their trip to Puerto Rico during laity session.

## **RESOLUTIONS AND PETITIONS**

#### **UNYAC 2024.1 Beginning the Work of Reparations**

Book of Resolutions paragraph 3066

Brief Rationale: Given the lingering legacy of slavery on the racial wealth gap, the monetary value we know that was placed on enslaved Blacks and the fact that Blacks were originally awarded reparations only to have them rescinded provide overwhelming evidence that it is time to begin the work of reparations to the descendants of enslaved Blacks.

Amendment: the task force shall also include 2 youth. Resolution passed

#### UNYAC2024.2 LOCAL CONGREGATION SEMINARY GRANTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Conference Committee: Board of Ordained Ministry and District Committee on Ordained ministry

Brief Rationale: With the ever increasing cost of higher education and the hindrance it causes to candidates ministry, having a comprehensive list of scholarships and grants available through local congregations would help to offset the financial hardship of attending seminary.

Amendments: Information will be made publicly available by 2025 annual conference (Not January 1, 2025) **Passed** 

## UNYAC2024.3 RESOLUTION TO CREATE UNITED METHODISTS OF UPPER NY PARENTAL LEAVE POLICY

#### Conference Committee: Cabinet

Brief Rationale: This resolution would enact a Parental Leave policy for United Methodist of Upper NYU that guarantees 13 paid weeks of leave for clergy and church workers whose family are expanding by birth, adoption, or foster placement. **Passed**

#### **UNYAC2024.4 Clergy Time off Policy**

Conference Committee: Committee on Equitable Compensation

Brief Rationale: This resolution calls on the UNYAC to support the wellness of all clergy persons who serve churches in the Upper NY AC by providing a consistent vacation and days off policies for all Pastors. **Passed** 

#### UNYAC2024.5 End US Funding for Israel's Military Occupation of Palestine

Conference Committee: Conference Secretary

The UMC has long been opposed to the continued Israeli military occupation of the occupied Palestinian Territories. (United Book of Resolutions, #6111) **Passed** 

#### **UNYAC2024.7 United Methodist Properties and Events are Gun Free Zones**

Conference Committees: Buildings Committees, Camping and Retreat Ministries.

Brief Rationale: In our society, where it seems anyone who wants one has a gun, the church leads to claim that they are a safe space in effort to truly be welcoming to all people. This resolution seeks to live into three General conference resolutions: #251, which affirmed that "the traditional role of the The UMC has been one of safety and sanctuary:" #5011 "Church is a Weapon-Free Zone;" and #3428, "Our Call to End Gun Violence"

Amendments included that security personnel, law enforcement, and other such persons are there to provide protection needed for that church. Also, instead of one policy across the board, local churches are to determine their own need for a safe gun free zone. **Passed** 

The most exciting part of annual conference this year, was having the opportunity to witness the commissioning of our own Pastor Danyal. The ceremony was beautiful, and the

holy spirit was present in this space.

The Bishop began with some comforting words of faith and hope. We celebrated the life and ministries of retirees, and those that have gone before us. Then, we witnessed the commissioning of the 4 individuals being commissioned for the work of full Elder in the UMC. We also celebrated one person being consecrated as Deaconess, and one person transferring into our Upper NY





Conference. It is a special moment, and we look forward to Pastor is Ordained as a full Elder in the UMC. supporting Pastor Danyal as he works toward Ordination as a full Elder in the UMC.

We had so many wonderful speakers, presenters, times of worship, all times together we cherish as an annual conference. Victor Giso had an opportunity to speak about the importance of youth in the decision making process of our conference.

On October 2 at 7:00 pm, the speaker series will feature Jenna Masters and Carmen Story of Masters' Apiaries Storv at Woods Farm. As a motherdaughter duo, Jenna and Carmen started their beekeeping journey in March 2020 - one month before Covid-19 shut down the world. The imposed isolation gave mother and daughter the opportunity to further their knowledge and commitment to bees and other pollinators. They joined two local clubs, attended seminars and obtained Master Beekeeper Certifications through Cornell University. They grew their business from 2 to 16 hives. established relationships with five retailers who sell their products and mentored aspiring beekeepers. Jenna and Carmen are excited to share their knowledge of beekeeping's role in providing flourishing and sustainable habitats for ALL pollinators - not just honey bees!

They will describe how a hive operates, how bees evolved to be collectors of nectar and pollen and how surrounding plants play a role. They will share what you can do to support honey bees and other native species. Most important, they'll discuss what you'll need to become a beekeeper, including classes, equipment, optimal location, and

more. The talk will last 60-90 minutes and will include a question-and-answer period. Refreshments will be served.
