difference in our community. We look forward to seeing you at our next meeting and working together to create a community where mental health is supported and nurtured.

In addition to our monthly meetings, we will be hosting a series of workshops and seminars aimed at providing practical tools and resources for mental health. 
THANKSGIVING AND HOLIDAY COFFEE HOUSE

Make a Good Day

We are about 20 who gather weekly to learn, build community and cherish friendships. Pastor Danyal leads us in worship and communion the first Tuesday of each month. Jean Sheviak and Carrie Larson lead us in a variety of "Good News" activities including hymn sings, prayer, and discussions on topics addressing our own spir-




itual journeys. For example, on Tuesday the 15th, we reviewed quotes from Holy Books of 11 different religions on the importance of peace, truth and justice. Then, we shared ideas about Aging and Strength: How do you find strength and purpose as you age? What practices help you feel supported and not forsaken? Answers included: "Courage, we have to accept where we are in life...and then USE IT". Use what we learned from our experience and that we have lived and learned a long time. Even if we can't do all we used to be able to do, we can SPEAK OUR TRUTH". "Each day there seems to be little I can do but I can speak my truth without fear and tell others what I believe is true." "I feel COURAGE to be who we are and find purpose in helping others". "When I was younger and always busy, I

had lists each day. Now I have a broader view of life and I spend more time each day staying connected to people who are important to me."

OUR JOURNEY TO BECOMING A RECONCILING CONGREGATION

Many people have had a part in making our church a **Reconciling Congregation**. One of those persons was the Rev. Bruce Robbins who died this past August 3. Bruce was many things in the church, he wore many hats. United Methodist News tells us, "He was a longtime advocate for LGBTQ rights and never stopped pushing for dialogue ecumenically and among United Methodists with theological differences on the issue."

Bruce was a storyteller. One of his stories was about a businessman in New York City where Bruce worked for a number of years and where he had an office in the *God Box*, The Interchurch Center, 475 Riverside Drive in Manhattan, when he was the staff executive of the UMC Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. The story... the



Bruce was born in Brooklyn, later attended Oberlin College and held degrees from Union Seminary and Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University. Many other events and activities, both here at home and at many other points in the world helped in shaping Bruce's ministry. One was volunteer work with the Missionary Brothers of Charity in India, a group associated with Mother Teresa. "He credited Mother Teresa with changing his life, which 'set my course in ministry in The United Methodist Church'".

I met with Bruce a number of times at the *God Box* to discuss both Christian Unity and Reconciling Ministry. While there, Bruce was a member of our own, former, Troy Conference. Bruce and I also had a little time together at General Conference, meeting that year, 2004, in Pittsburgh. Their meetings were always productive.

Following Bruce's stint in New York City, he became senior pastor of Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church in Minneapolis, from which he later retired from active ministry.
